CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

LAY-OFFS IN MONCTON

Mr. Fernand Robichaud (Westmorland-Kent): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Transport. In reply to a question which I asked the Minister last October 9, the Minister indicated that CN lay-offs in Moncton were a result of a decline in traffic and that he hoped the lay-offs would not continue for a long period of time. Can the Minister then explain why 140 of the 225 workers who were laid off were informed that their lay-offs were permanent? And that, Mr. Prime Minister, is not good news.

Hon. Don Mazankowski (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I think the Hon. Member is fully aware of the decline in CN traffic and of the fact that the available workload requires some adjustment in the work force.

Ms. Copps: You're too busy running around arresting people.

Some Hon. Members: Shush!

Mr. Mazankowski: CN is currently conducting an internal assessment of its maintenance requirements. I suspect that that evaluation will be completed some time early in the new year. At that time we will be looking at various options. I will certainly take the Hon. Member's representations and convey them to the management of the CNR. That is something that the Hon. Member for Moncton has been doing a very good job of, Mr. Speaker.

REQUEST THAT MINISTER ASSURE PROTECTION OF JOBS

Mr. Fernand Robichaud (Westmorland-Kent): Mr. Speaker, there is a cloud of uncertainty hanging over Moncton right now. There are over 1,000 jobs on the line. When will the Minister take a stand on this issue and assure those people in Moncton that their jobs will be protected? This, Mr. Minister, would be very good news.
