Moreover, heart disease represents a major burden for all societies, not only in terms of human suffering but also as a result of high health care costs and the loss of productivity.

Let us make World Health Day 1992 a success by working individually and collectively to prevent and control cardio-vascular disease in the days and years ahead.

CANADA POST

Mr. Rod Murphy (Churchill): Mr. Speaker, why can the House of Commons not receive answers to straightforward questions from Canada Post?

In response to a series of questions I asked about the number of closures Canada Post planned for this year, Canada Post president Don Landers said:

We have a corporate plan where we identify the possibility of conversions in relation to natural opportunities and that is the way in which we work out programs through the course of the year.

Then he said:

Somebody can die and so forth, but we have some idea of what the conversion rate would be and we do not approach it as closures but rather we approach it as a change in the type of service.
