ST. PATRICK'S DAY

TRIBUTE TO ST. PATRICK AND THE IRISH PEOPLE

Hon. William M. Kelly: Honourable senators, I should like to draw to the attention of colleagues that today is St. Patrick's Day.

Hon. Senators: Hear, hear!

Senator Kelly: I believe that it is important to draw this day to the attention of colleagues, because, with the exception of Senator Kirby's tie, which I saw a minute ago, I see few green ties or other evidence of a green nature to mark the occasion.

Senator Kelly: Nonetheless, honourable senators, I think it is a sad day—I see Peter Bosa has his green tie on. Thank you, Peter. I think it is a sad day that things of an Irish nature are forgotten, as they have been.

In times past, there was one senator who always sang an Irish song on March 17. The only person I know in this chamber who has a thoroughly beautiful voice is Senator Frith, and I thought perhaps he would do us the honour.

Hon. Senators: Hear, hear!

Senator Kelly: If he will lead us we will all join in.

Senator Roblin: Something from the Mikado.

Hon. Royce Frith (Leader of the Opposition): Honourable senators, I thank Senator Kelly for the compliment. I ask that the Speaker instruct the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to go down to the House of Commons and invite the Prime Minister to come here and sing "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling," and, if he has time, to get Mr. Reagan here to sing it as a duet, and we will wait.

Senator Kelly: As my final statement on this address, St. Patrick's Day is a time when we should all be nice to one another.

Hon. Senators: Hear, hear!
