LEADS ATTACK ON ABSENT MAYOR

Controller Church Tries Ineffectually to Upset Sale of Hydro Bonds.

QUESTION OF LEGALITY

Property Commissioner Reports Against Re-Erection of Hat Factory.

While Mayor Hoeken was at the laying of the corner-stone of the new central technical school building yesterday morning, Controller Church presided at the board of control, and did his utmost to upset the recent sale of hydro bonds. At first he was backed by Controller Foster, but when Controller McCarthy was thru with them Controller Church was alone in his fight and went down and out.

Controller Church led off by demanding that the city solicitor be asked for a written opinion upon the legality of the sale of the bonds. He reiterated his charge that Mayor Hoeken and Deputy City Treasurer Patterson had negotiated the sale without calling a meeting of the treasury board, and that the bylaw provides that the sale should be made thru the treasury board. He added that "the sale was unsatisfactory in some respects."

"It is a matter between yourself and Mayor Hoeken," Controller McCarthy said to Controller Church. "You should not take it up until the mayor is here. I ask it out of courtesy to the mayor."

"No courtesy was shown me," Controller Church declared.

"No matter in which any one member of the board is directly concerned should be dealt with unless that member is present," Controller McCarthy urged.

"I agree with that," said Controller O'Neill.

"The mayor will be here tomorrow, and we could have the opinion of the solicitor ready then," Controller Church insisted.

"Do you want to block the sale?" Controller McCarthy demanded, "or block those who bought the bonds from selling them again? The people who bought the bonds would like to get out of the purchase agreement tomorrow if they could."

"It would not be very serious if the sale was called off," Controller Foster declared. "If you throw over the British market by going into the American market for money you will not be able to go back to the British market. It is putting a noose around the neck of hydro to sell the bonds at the price agreed upon."

"The sale has been negotiated," Controller McCarthy said. "The mayor should be present before we ask the solicitor for an opinion upon the legality of the sale."

"I am satisfied to leave it until tomorrow," Controller Foster at once conceded, and that ended the matter.

Want Sewer Laid. Deputation from the Midway asking that a sewer be constructed on Highfield road and the sewerage work concurrently with the sewerage work now being done on Hlawatha street. Commissioner Harris promised that Highfield road would have a sewer before the outlet for Hlawatha street sewer is completed.

Commissioner Harris reported that he had closed the west side of Yonge street, from King street to Melinda street, because the excavation for the Dominion bank building had caused the pavement to sink about an inch.

"The contractor wants permission to work a couple of Sundays to get the steel work well started," said Controller Church. "With two sky-scraper being built at the corner of King and Yonge streets the interference with traffic there will be serious."

Commissioner Chisholm reported against granting a permit to rebuild the recently burned Crean hat factory on Balmuto street.

That hat factory was started 43 years ago, when it was surrounded by fields," said Controller McCarthy. "I cannot take advantage of the fire to put Mr. Crean out of business."

"Neither can I," Controller O'Neill said.

"We'll have a hearing on Thursday morning from all interested parties," said Controller Church, and this was adopted.

either at once or before the king's bench in October."

News a Disappointment.

Mr. Jerome and District Attorney Conger were at dinner when Thaw's counsel made known their decision. They had been hoping, like others drawn here by duty, that tomorrow would see a sweeping away of some of the legal cobwebs and the beginning of a fight in the open profane a hissing before the immigration authorities and Thaw's probable deportation to Vermont.

The news spread quickly thru the hotel corridors. Sheriff Hornbeck of Dutchess County, who is particularly anxious to get home, expressed his great disgust. The handcuffs and leg irons he brought with him have proved only a burden, and he has been roaming about town for a week waiting for something to turn up.

Thaw could not be seen, in view of a new rule of the sheriff barring interviewers except when accompanied by some of his counsel; but that he was consulted before any action was taken was attested by the fact that his signature, with that of his attorney of record, W. L. Shurtleff, was signed to the application. It was a mere formality with Thaw, tho, for the greater part of the day he spent in working out more details of his publicity campaign. His ambitions may be nipped to some extent by the curtailment of interviews, but he can still send out statements.

The declining to express an opinion as to what will happen in the Thaw case next, Mr. Jerome took the hitch in the proceedings philosophically, and after finishing his evening meal went out and toasted his shins with a group in front of the big open fireplace at the Magog House. Most of the afternoon he had spent tinkering with the automobile in which he made the trip up here.
