IN TRIPLE CASKET

Funeral of Late Pope Pius X.

Began Yesterday

Afternoon.

A TEMPORARY TOMB

Body Lies in a Niche Until

Permanent Resting Place

is Prepared.

ROME, Aug. 22.—Preparations for

the entombment of the body of Pope

Pius X. were begun at 4 o'clock this

afternoon, after the death of the

pontiff had been announced. The

body, which is enclosed in three

caskets, the first of cypress

wood, the second of lead, and a third

of oak.

The ceremony is attended by the

members of the noble guard, digni-

taries of the papal court, the cardinals

and prelates in regalia of their

office, together with the members

of the family of the late pontiff, members

of the papal diplomatic corps, and

members of the patrician families of

Rome.

The Pope's body will be carried from

the chapel of the sacrament to the

choir chapel, amid the singing of

psalms and funeral rites by the choir.

When the last of the three

caskets is sealed the body will then

be lifted to the niche to the left of

the choir chapel, where it remains

until the permanent tomb is prepared.

A slab of marble closes the niche.

Prepare for Conclave.

Late yesterday 23 cardinals met in

the first congregation of cardinals to

arrange for the temporary governing

of the church and prepare for the

conclave, when a new Pope will be elected.
