

THE SENATE OF CANADA

BILL Q¹⁶.

An Act for the relief of Alfred Sevigny.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Alfred Sevigny, domiciled in Canada and residing at the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, salesman, has by his petition alleged that on the twentieth day of October, A.D. 1936, at the town of St. Georges de Beauce, in the said province, he and Jeannette Boucher, who was then of the said town, a spinster, were married; and whereas by his petition he has prayed that, because of her adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of his petition be granted: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved.

1. The said marriage between Alfred Sevigny and Jeannette Boucher, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again.

2. The said Alfred Sevigny may at any time hereafter marry any woman whom he might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said Jeannette Boucher had not been solemnized.
