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FOURTH OF CITY WAS DESTROYED

Shelling of Dedeagahatch by
Warships Caused Great
Damage.

VARNA SUFFERED TOO

Sofia Claims That Many
Civilians Were Killed or
Injured.

SOPIA, Oct. 27.—(Via London, Oct.
28, 3.30 a.m.)—The damage done by
the bombardment of Aegean Sea towns
and villages by the allied fleet recently
was greater than at first reported.
One-fourth of the entire city of De-
deagahatch was razed by the shells of
the warships.

Also the bombardment of Varna by
the Russian fleet lasted only 10 min-
utes, the bodies of 22 civilians already
have been found, while over 100 per-
sons were injured, and the city severely,
according to reports received here.

The Russian fleet was sighted at 8
o'clock in the morning rapidly ap-
proaching the city and opened fire
while still at a great distance. It
approached, to within a little over
three miles, but withdrew before the
Bulgarian batteries could make their
fire effective.

According to officials here the Rus-
sians never searched for the Bul-
garian batteries, but merely shelled
the city, especially the harbor sec-
tions, where Greeks form the major-
ity of the population. The people
are greatly excited over the bomb-
ardments of Bulgarian cities on the Ae-
gean and Black Seas.

REPORTERS TO FORM

A CENTRAL EXECUTIVE

Proposal Discussed at Meeting

Held in Clinton School by

Delegates Last Night.

A move to start a central reporters' association was heard last night at a meeting held in Clinton School last evening. The object is to form an execu-
tive committee, which will represent
the various reporters' associations
throughout the city, thus making a
central body which will deal with all
larger problems of municipal govern-
ment. Some of the delegates at last night's
meeting favored the organization, while
others held back on the grounds that
their associations had not given them
power to vote. It was decided that those
present be considered a committee to
