Fugitive from Justice. On his arrival in England, Capt. Mulford drew up and prefented "A Memorial of Several Aggrievances and Oppreffions of His Majefty's Subjects in the Colony of New York, in America." This Paper, which was referred to the Board of Trade, was printed in England, and a number of Copies communicated to Members of the Houfe of Commons. In September, 1717, Gov. Hunter called the attention of the Affembly to this "very strange Memorial," and the Houfe voted it "a most false, malicious and scandalous paper," demanded that the Author be brought to Juffice, and, alluding to Capt. Mulford, declared that, "tho one of the Affembly of this Colony, he is very much a Stranger to the Affairs and Interests of it, and, to promote his
