


asked for in the constitution. It was the intention of the officer to resign if the Dominion Board did not grant their request. Three hour of heated debate had the effect of the officials in charge all resigning, but they changed their minds when the majority asked them to reconsider the matter for a week. The chief conflic was between two factions of the asso ciation, and they both made charges, which proved to be merely personali

ties. The meeting was finally adjourned until next Monday. The proposed amendments called for greater power in local branches and for a reduction of the per capita tax fee, but owing to important legislation that the Dominion and provincial boards were engaged in securing and opposing, the fee could not be changed.
