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## CANADIAN OUTBREAK IN ENGLISH CAMPS

Several Policemen Wounded, One Fatally, in Attack on Epsom Police Station.

London, June 18.—Unrest among Canadian soldiers in England because of continued postponement of home-ward sailings culminated last night in an attack by 400 Canadian soldiers on Epsom police station. Several policemen were wounded, one so seriously that he died this morning. The purpose of the attack was to release Canadian soldiers who had been arrested.

To avoid further trouble the police released another Canadian in the mob who was not interested in the attack.

During the last few days there has been trouble in the Canadian camp at Whitley where the soldiers burned huts and did other damage, according to reports.

There is much sympathy here for the Canadian soldiers who repeatedly have been given dates for home-ward sailings, only to be told that further postponement was necessary owing to strikes of dock-workers at Liverpool and other ports or to lack of transport.

The unrest has not been confined to the Canadians. There have also been protests by Australians and New Zealanders. Some Scottish soldiers, composed of veterans, recently held a demonstration against being sent back to France, while men who had not seen active service remained in England or are demobilized.

Camp trouble has spread to Ripon. A demonstration occurred on Tuesday afternoon in the lines of the Canadian 23rd reserve battalion, because their sailing to Canada had been put off from the 15th indefinitely and on night picket duty being ordered on.

Partly through resentment of the men on night picket duty being ordered on, broken into and stocks consumed or destroyed, including barrels of beer, and during the investigation the gymnasium hut was fired and burned.

**C.O.F. TO MEET NEXT IN CITY OF MONTREAL**

London, Ont., June 18.—The Canadian Order of Foresters, in convention here, have decided to hold the annual meeting in Montreal in 1950.

A. A. Broderick, of Montreal, was elected high grand ranger at the 1950 convention of the order.

He is a member of the Montreal city council and a prominent attorney of that city. F. H. Davidson, of Winnipeg, was selected for vice ranger, and as treasurer, W. M. Couper, of Montreal, was elected.

West Dunneville, is chairman, and Robert Elliott, and A. P. Van Someren, both of Brantford, have been nominated for secretary.

**SPARTACANS ATTACK CASTLE AT WEIMAR**

Weimar, June 18.—Fifty Spartacan and Communist prisoners, recently released from the Weimar jail, shortly after midnight this morning, attacked the castle where the members of the government live.

The attacking party made a surprise descent upon the castle and disarmed the guards at the entrance. They indulged in firing through the windows, however, and this aroused the castle troops.

It was apparently the intention of the party to seize President Ebert's residence, but they were repulsed by the castle troops.

After midnight the castle was shelled by the Spartacans, but the attack was repulsed.

**People of Saskatchewan To Be Independent of Party**

Weyburn, Sask., June 18.—C. M. Hamilton, of MacTaggart, was nominated as the Liberal candidate for provincial constituency of Weyburn here yesterday. Mr. Hamilton stated he intended to resign from the board of directors of the Canadian national railways, and paid a tribute to the members as determined to make good.

He said, "Let me make myself clear. While I believe in a reorganized Liberal party with a progressive platform is the best medium of expression for the people of Saskatchewan, I do not intend, on western opinion, to follow the Liberal party or any other party. I want a clear-cut policy of the people of this country."

**BREIT JAIL ATTACKED BY FRENCH SAILORS**

Brest, June 18.—Two hundred French sailors, carrying a red flag, attempted to enter the naval jail here yesterday to rescue imprisoned sailors. The attempts failed. There were no casualties.

The imprisoned sailors were from the French battleship Justice, which arrived here from Sebastopol, a Russian Black Sea port.

The city is more calm today, but the situation is considered to be still serious.

**CANOE UP PACIFIC.**

Prince Rupert, B. C., June 18.—George E. Russell, bound for St. Michael, Alaska, in an 18-foot canoe, has arrived here from Seattle, having paddled all the way from there in 35 days. His journey, he says, was uneventful.

**LIVE STOCK MARKET.**

Receipts of cattle of all kinds at the Union Stock Yards yesterday were 1123 head in all, a moderately good run, while the market for all classes and especially for choice butchers' steers and heifers was steady to strong and relatively firm. Activity was manifest in Tuesday's close.

The run of nearly 1300 head was well cleaned up. Choice butchers' steers and heifers were strong and we would say about 25c higher. Well and altogether, springers are selling the decided impetus of Monday and the added strength yesterday is recovered for choice butchers and two or three loads of extra good short-keep feeder.

In the small stuff the sheep and lambs are now selling at the pound bringing from 12 1/2c to 13 1/2c. Choice light yearlings brought from 9c to 10c per lb. heavy yearlings 10c to 11c per lb.

The calf market with a run of 479 head, held steady with Tuesday's prices. Choice veal calves run around from 18c to 19c per lb. certainly has gone skyrocketing, and has probably by today's strong prices reached a peak.
