FLOODS IN NEW YORK STATE.

Damage Has Been Done at Many Points, But No Par No Loss of Life is Reported.

New York, March 27.—From many parts of the state come news today and tonight of damage by floods. The waters of rivers and the smaller tributary streams are reported as overflowing their banks, causing widespread inundations, which threaten to destroy much property, if not bring about loss of life, before they begin to subside. The rise at Genesee during last night was six inches and farms in the vicinity suffered. Much damage is reported from Caledonia. The people at Corvids are alarmed at the rush of waters there, as the floor threatens to sweep houses in the lower part of the city. A similar state of affairs existed at Binghamton early today, where manufacturing plants were forced to suspend and where the citizens were on the alert to prevent a serious catastrophe, but no great damage has as yet resulted.

RYAN WOULDN'T LEAVE TORONTO.

Now the Police Will Try to Make Him Stay Here Against His Will.

John Ryan, a young man who says he lives at 332 Elliott street, Buffalo, was taken into custody last night by Detective Slemin on a charge of vagrancy. Ryan's the man who was arrested in the T. Eaton store Feb. 27 last in connection with the David Fleit, on charges of stealing a horse and \$17 from Mrs. Edith Pinkney, and a railway ticket and \$11 from Mrs. Maggie Maw. Fleit was discharged on his application to the Police Court and Ryan was released for trial. The grand jury at the Sessions reported no bill in the case of theft from Mrs. Maw and indicted him on the charge preferred by Mrs. Pinkney. He was acquitted by a jury and subsequently re-arrested by Detective Harrows at the instance of the Cleveland authorities, who wanted him to answer a charge of picking pockets on March 29, 1900. He was taken into custody at the time, but failed to appear for trial. The Cleveland papers reported that Inspector Stark thought that he would not do the expense of instituting extradition proceedings and Ryan was released. He was told to leave town, but failed to do so, and his arrest followed last night. Ryan is also known to the police here as Matthew MacMahon and John Landis.

LONDON SAVED FROM FLOOD.

Lowering Temperature of Tuesday Night Helped to Avert Threatened Disaster.

London, Ont., March 27.—The partial opening of the flood gates in the Sprucebank dam and the lowered temperature last night, with their consequent results of draining off the water already in the basin of the river between the city and Sprucebank, and lessening the supply of water from the headwaters, have averted for the present the fears entertained of a flood in West London.

THE DANISH WEST INDIES.

Population of the Islands to Decide Whether They Will Become American.

London, March 28.—The Daily News publishes the following despatch from its Copenhagen correspondent: "I am emboldened to state, on the very best authority, that Denmark has communicated to the United States the following conditions for the sale of the Danish West Indies: "First, \$4,000,000 to be paid to Denmark. "Second, the population to decide by vote whether to remain Danish or to be transferred to America. "Third, if the vote is favorable to the United States, then the inhabitants to become immediately not only American subjects, but American citizens. "Fourth, products of the island to be admitted to the United States free of duty. "It is supposed here that Washington will not readily accept the third and fourth conditions."

KRUGER WANTS PEACE.

London, March 28.—The official casualty list issued today shows a total of 100 active operations since the failure of the negotiations between Lord Kitchener and Gen. Botha. At Hartbeesfontein, March 22 and 23, two officers were killed and three wounded, and four men killed and 20 wounded.
