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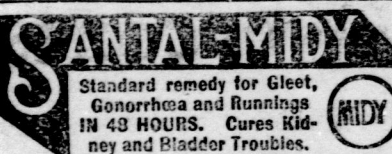

LORD ABERDEEN

AS A FARMER

HIS GREAT FRUIT RANCH IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Selling it at One Hundred and Fifty Dollars an Acre—A Triumph of Irrigation.

Some twelve years ago, Lord Aberdeen, then viceroy of Canada, and now for a second time viceroy of Ireland, purchased from Mr. Forbes George Vernon, the Coldstream ranch of about 13,000 acres for a sum approaching \$250,000. The ranch is situated in the Okanagan valley. It is a productive and extensive tract, and under the intelligent management of Mr. Ricardo, Lord Aberdeen's representative, is yielding a handsome profit upon the investment, although only about 1,700 acres of the 13,000 are under cultivation. Orlan Black, who has visited the ranch, contributes a paper to the October number of the Pall Mall Magazine, in which he describes the farm and explains the methods in vogue there. Before cultivation began, the land was dry and barren, the hillsides thinly clad with grass that is brown and dry, but nourishing for cattle, which roam over 3,300 acres that have been set apart as a range. On this range 900 cattle thrive and breed. Some 1,200 acres are under timber, leaving 5,700 acres available for cultivation. Last year, the writer says, 250 acres consisted of orchards. In 1904, 50 acres had reached the fruit-bearing stage, with another 50 acres ready to graduate into the mature class the following autumn. The fruit crop of 1904 amounted to nearly 1,000,000 pounds in weight. Three-fourths of the crop consisted of apples, the second place being taken by plums, prunes and cherries. Canadian apples and plums are unsurpassed in the world, and those grown on Lord Aberdeen's farm are unsurpassed in Canada. In the new provinces of the Northwest and Manitoba one sees the Aberdeen fruit on sale in every shop; while on the Pacific coast it ranks with the best products of Washington Territory and Oregon, while California fruit is outclassed by the British Columbia article. But not only for fruit is Lord Aberdeen's ranch becoming famous. The hops grown there are of the highest grade, and having been picked by Indians and dried in kilns are compressed into bales and shipped off to Eastern Canada and England. The farm proper consists of about 700 acres, mostly under wheat, barley, oats and potatoes, with another 500 acres of artificial hay. There are 80 work horses that are fed with grain raised on the farm, and a herd of swine are sent to market every year. The ranch has a sawmill, where it cuts its own lumber, and water power is utilized in the production of electric light, with which, as well as a telephone system, the ranch is equipped. The main fall in the valley is slight and uncertain, and without irrigation the enterprise would be unremunerative. So water is brought from the hills eight miles distant in ditches and ditches, and distributed by gravitation over the farm. His high-bred stock, over the profit-laden stream down from the mountains for his own use, Lord Aberdeen is now putting it at the disposal of others. He is laying out 20-acre and 40-acre plots for settlers who wish to follow his example, and become farmers. This land is sold at an average figure of \$150 an acre. If the new settler lacks experience and does not wish to plunge at once into a calling of which he knows nothing, he can have the initial planting of his

orchard carried out by the skilled labor of the Coldstream ranch, and \$2 he lacks facilities for marketing his crop he has only to hand it over to the Coldstream staff, who will pack, and ship, and sell it with their own. Mr. Black says that there is growing up in the valley a community which will preserve the traditions and refinements of the old land while adopting the industry of the new; a community which owes its origin, as it is likely to owe its success, to the enterprise of Lord Aberdeen in buying and working the Coldstream ranch. The article is illustrated with photographs of Lord Aberdeen, Mr. Ricardo and his staff, the office and residence and landscapes of the farm. In the Vancouver market today may be seen many boxes of Coldstream apples of choice varieties, chief among which are the gravenstein and the snow-apple. The future of the province as a producer of fruit is bright, and the day is not remote when British Columbia apples will have become as famous as those of the Gaius and the Annapolis valleys.

LONDON SEEN BY A FRENCH WOMAN

ITS CLIMATE, POLICEMEN, AND STAYS PRAISED BY AUTHORITY.

"And the 'jeune Anglaise,' madame, what is your impression of her?" "Ah! the 'jeune Anglaise,' let me see, and madame put on her reflecting cap for a moment or two. 'She is much more charming and graceful, much more delightful and better dressed, than I had imagined her to be. We Parisians make the mistake of thinking as the national type the young English woman whom we see in the Rue de Rivoli. It is a vast mistake to suppose they are like that at home. When the English 'tourist' goes abroad she thinks as much as she can to wear nothing of dress. Her object is to see and be seen. It never occurs to her that she is under a sort of international obligation to dress well. She wears big, comfortable boots, any kind of a hat, and she does not lace up."

"Really?" I said, immensely interested. "No," pursued my fair interlocutor, disregarding the interruption. "Contrast the London girl with the Parisienne. The latter never for a moment loses her instinct to please; it is in-born. Consequently, we are ready to suffer tortures in order to look nice. Our boots are too small and we are never at our ease in our 'curtains.' I admire the way of the English girl; it is much more practical and much more sensible; but I am afraid we are always 'tourists' to us abroad. When we go abroad we are always asking ourselves: 'What do they think of me?' Really, you cannot wear big boots then can you?" And the Parisienne looked dangerously coquettish and illogical.

"Well," I said, severely, in an effort to keep the conversation on the strict level, "Did you find the English girl coquette chez elle?" "I was much surprised at her smartness and taste in dress. In their own homes the English women, dressed beautifully, they do not care about parading before strangers, evidently." "Were there other discoveries made?" "Yes—the climate. I was astonished. Then it does not always rain, and there is not always a fog in your London. It is wonderful. During some of our days it was frightfully hot, and your policemen—oh! your beautiful policemen—fell like flies in the street, struck down by the cruel sun. It was terrible!"

Talk of the policemen made my charming informant think that the official and semi-official class in London were thoughtful and attentive. "Your railway porters are most obliging," she observed, "so much better than our own, who never arrange things for you as the Englishman does." "But this is a perfect picture, madame—a beautiful climate, adorable policemen—were there no black spots?" Madame hesitated for the tenth part of a second, and then said, deliberately, "Yes—your food."

What are the cows worth that produce 400 pounds of butter per annum? Here I am going to make a statement and undertake to prove it correct, says Mr. H. B. Gurlier, as quoted by Hoard's Dairyman. GREAT SUN DIAL AT DELHI, INDIA

SHADOWS FALL ON ARCHES BUILT IN SEVENTH CENTURY.

The largest sun dial in the world is at Delhi, in India. Dr. Riem, of the Royal Astronomical Institute in Berlin has recently completed the difficult task of making a model of this dial. The exact date is not known—Jal Sing II, influenced probably by the Jesuits, erected at Delhi, Benares and other places observatories, the ruins of which still exist. The natives know little or nothing of the meaning of these ruins, and reports of English travelers of the last century have given the only definite information which we possess as to the form and use of the mural instruments. The peculiarity of this work, giving it a unique position among the astronomical monuments of the world, says the Deutsche Oermacher Zeitung, is that wall and instrument are one. It is one of the oldest which have been preserved (the oldest in Europe being the Leyden observatory, built in 1625), and here were determined the obliquity of the ecliptic, the length and breadth, declination and position of the equinoctial line.

A narrow flight of stone steps like a ladder parallel with the axis of the earth leads straight upward. Its supporting walls are smooth marble, and the shadow falls upon great marble arches, built out at the right and left, and marks the time when the sun is shining so minutes. Galleries and steps allow access from all sides.

The platforms of the building were once used, probably, for smaller portable instruments, which have fallen to pieces. Before the year 1800 Englishmen found the building used for horse stalls. This equatorial dial is about 35 feet high, the length of the oblique edge is 116 feet, and the radius of the circle about 19 feet. Near it stand the ruins of an obliquely inclined astronomical construction whose purpose is unknown.

The observations seem to have been longer continued at Benares, the residence of the Great Mogul. At least, Dr. Riem was able to glean by information from English sources of the eighteenth century, to reconstruct some small instruments which were still known at that time in Benares.

But the saying "ex oriente lux," applied to the sciences of astronomy, seems to have no great significance here, for in spite of the construction of this observatory, no accurate results were obtained.

THE VALUE OF REST.

[New York Post.] The subject of focus and rest is continually up for public and private discussion. Before the physical section at the last meeting of the British Association, Drs. Theodore Acland and Bevan Lewis had something to say in opposition to present-day theories of rest. The toxic bodies produced by exhaustion of one set of centers affect centers which have been unused, so that the evil effects of an overworked brain are not counteracted by muscular activity. The same subject has lately been discussed by M. Fere, a physician at Bicetre who also challenges the popular doctrine that rest is secured by a change of work. The only remedy for fatigue is sleep. Stimulants may induce energy temporarily, but fatigue follows all the more rapidly. Rest, says M. Fere, to be beneficial, must be taken free and not enforced. But those who are forced to rest are apt to desire renewed activity. M. Fere would probably not approve of the principles of the hotelkeeper of Jersey City, who declared: "I like people to do as they please, and when they won't do as they please I make 'em."

Litia, the son of King Lewanika of Africa, is described as a most intelligent man, anxious for the improvement of the people, and probably sharing the view of his father, who, on his return from attending the coronation, began his opening speech to his people with the words: "You are baboons!
