

'WARE EXPLOSION SAYS VON BUELOW

Tells Europe Germany Must
Not Be Isolated.

THE FRENCH TO BE WATCHED

Relations With Neighbor Requires Ger-
mans To Be on the Alert
and Armed.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—Chancellor von Bue-
low, from the place in the Reichstag
where he fell unconscious seven months
ago, spoke for 45 minutes today on
Germany's foreign relations to a high-
ly interested audience, including Baron
von Aehrenthal, the Austro-Hungarian
foreign minister; Ambassador and Mrs.
Charlemagne Tower, several other am-
bassadors and quite 50 members of the
diplomatic corps, who occupied seats
in the diplomatic enclosure. Princes
von Buelow sat in the front row of
the chairs in the court box.

Immediately after Prince von Bue-
low had entered the House and bowed
his acknowledgments of the applause,
the president of the House rang his
bell, calling the Reichstag to order.

Herr Bassermann, National-Liberal,
following up his question of yesterday,
asking for information regarding the
country's foreign relations, said that
since Prince Bismarck left Germany
respected and loved by her neighbors
the country's foreign policy had en-
tered on a period of quietude, speeches,
telegrams and courtesies—a period of
unsteadiness which caused disquiet not
only at home, but abroad.

Germany Isolated

Herr Bassermann then described
Germany's position among her neigh-
bors as isolated, saying she had no
firm friends, not even Italy or Austria.

Chancellor von Bue-low's reply was
marked by his old-time clearness of
eloquence and harmonious succession of
sentences, but there was less vivacity
and lightness of style than formerly.

After thanking the members of the
House for their expressions of sym-
pathy during his illness, the chancellor
went at once into the subject. Referring
first to the relations between Germany
and France the chancellor related a
conversation which he had had
with the late Leon Gambetta, in which
the French statesman said:

"France has sunk to her knees."
Von Bue-low's reply was:

"Up and forward."

The emotions of France, the chan-
cellor added, were like a thermometer,
with a pressure of the hand the quick-
silver rose or fell.

Be Alert and Armed

"I may remark here," he continued,
"that this vivacity of French patri-
otism is very strong, as is the ambition
of the French people, and also the
traditional enmity between France and
Germany, which requires us to be alert
and armed, so that we may protect the
estate we lost on the Vosges and won
back again with streams of German
blood."

The chancellor, continuing, re-
marked:

"I hope and believe I can say that
we all, without distinction of party,
right and left, know that the number
of thoughtful Frenchmen who reject
the idea of a war of aggression against
Germany is increasing."

Turning to the subject of French
friendships the chancellor said:

"I wish to note with emphasis that
we do not think of pressing in be-
tween France and Russia, nor between
France and Great Britain. It is un-
thinkable that a disturbance of the
friendship between the western powers
should be the object of our open or
secret exertions. The good relations
between Germany and Russia have not
affected the Franco-Russian alliance,
and in the same manner the good re-
lations existing between Germany and
Great Britain cannot be opposed to the
cordial understanding between France
and Great Britain when the purposes
of that understanding are peaceful."

Danger to Peace

"An understanding between the
western powers without the mainte-
nance of good relations with Germany
would constitute a danger to peace.
The policy whose object would be to
encircle Germany by arrangements de-
signed to isolate and disable us would
be critical for the peace of Europe."

"The formation of such a thing is
impossible without using a certain
degree of pressure and causing in turn
a counter pressure which would be
followed shortly by an explosion."

AFTER ASSETS OF ONTARIO BANK

Strong Interests Said To Be
Willing to Purchase at
Forty Cents.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—It is stated that
within the last few days an effort has
been made by some interests to secure
the assets of the Ontario Bank, and
that an offer has been made which,
if it was her duty to have a navy
proportionate to her merchant marine.

The meeting of King Edward
and Emperor William in August had a
favorable influence on the relations of
Germany with Great Britain.

During the course of his speech in
the Reichstag today Chancellor von
Bue-low said:

"Our relations with the United States
continue on a most friendly basis, rest-
ing as they do upon historical and
natural reasons. The frontiers of the
two countries do not touch, nor do our
political interests collide anywhere.

In order to maintain economic rela-
tions it will be necessary to arrange a
mutually beneficial agreement in an
obliging spirit. As both sides have this
spirit it seems impossible that we
should not come to an understanding."

"I wish to take advantage of this
opportunity to express my sincere
confidence," that we are grateful for
the attitude of the United States at the
Algiers conference. The United States
had only a slight measure of inter-
est at Algiers and took a re-
served attitude, but throughout it was
impossible for the United States' ex-
cellent representatives, Mr. White, es-
teemed by all of us, took advantage of every
opportunity to harmonize antagonisms
and to contribute to an agreement
honorable for all the states concerned.
That is to be highly appreciated, be-
cause the failure of the conference
would not only have brought into the
relations of Germany and France a
disquieting, irritating element, but
would also have introduced it into the
general situation of the world. That
was the second great service the United
States has contributed to the peace of
the world: the first was assisting in
the restoration of peace between Russia
and Japan."

CUBA AFTER NEW BLOOD

Gov. Magoon Urged to Encourage Im-
migration to Island.

Havana, Nov. 14.—In view of the ap-
propriation of \$1,000,000 made by the
Cuban Congress to encourage immigra-
tion, Gov. Magoon asked economic
bodies to express their views on this
kindred questions. A report was
handed to Mr. Magoon today favoring
the encouragement of immigration and
the spending of \$800,000 on laborers and
\$200,000 on their families.

The report also favors a reduction of
the customs tariff in order to lower the
excessive cost of living. It urges the
governor to employ all the resources at
his command to make local authorities
and the police endeavor to re-establish
among the people those industrious
habits which have been so deeply af-
fected by the revolution.

A committee representing the eco-
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gon that Spain, the source of Cuba's
immigrants, is being tapped by the
United States and the South American
republics. Cuba, which needs immi-
grants from Spain and the Canary
Islands, it was urged, should stimulate
immigration in self-defense, especially
as laborers are needed to harvest the
sugar crop.

There is much cattle stealing in
Cameaguey. One owner, a foreigner,
says his cattle are stolen when on his
own land, but when he sends them to
pasture on land owned by Cubans they
are not touched. It is estimated 4,000
head of cattle were stolen last year.
The stealing was checked by rural
guards, but it has broken out again
since the revolution.

GERMANS PAY HALF

Will Settle San Francisco Insurance
Losses on 50 Per Cent Basis.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—As City Attorney
Newburg, of San Francisco, tells a re-
porter, three German insurance com-
panies doing business in Hamburg
have agreed to compromise with their
San Francisco policyholders. It is ex-
pected that the result will be a pay-
ment of about 50 per cent of their lia-
bilities. Mr. Newburg is convinced
that it is useless to hope for better
terms, that being the limit of the com-
panies' capacity. In order to pay even
this they will be obliged to make a
heavy reduction of real estate. More-
over, the German companies are se-
verely handicapped by the enormous
taxes on their reserved capital,
amounting to 10 per cent, against from
1 to 1½ in England.

A definite announcement of the
amount that can be paid will be impos-
sible in less than a month, owing to
the necessity of worldwide inquiries.
The Hamburg-Bremen Insurance Com-
pany, which is connected with the
Hamburg-American Steamship Com-
pany, is receiving every day hundreds
of complaints and threats of suits, all
calling for the full pound of flesh.

THE TIARA TILT

Favorite Form of Headdress Now With
London Society Women.

London, Nov. 14.—Fashion has
ruled that the tiara will be the favor-
ite form of headdress for evening cos-
tumes during the winter season, thou-
sands of women are practicing the
tiara tilt; that is, the correct angle
at which the tiara is most effective
relatively to the carriage of the head.
Ten years ago only titled ladies or
women worth millions wore tiaras.
Now there are few society women who
do not possess one. Of course, tiara
is an elastic word. It need not neces-
sarily represent a piece of diamond.
It may mean anything from that to a
wreath of metal leaves.

Among the most popular forms are
chaplets of flowers constructed of metal
and colored enamels, with such gems
as the wearer can afford. Amethysts,
turquoises and other of the less ex-
pensive kinds of stones are abundantly
used by the less ambitious, while min-
ute examinations sometimes reveals
blobs of colored sealing wax.

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GOSSIP COSTS LIVES OF FOUR

Man's Attack on Woman's Good
Name Causes Murder and
Three Suicides.

Owosso, Mich., Nov. 13.—The slight-
ing words of one man concerning the
honor of a neighbor's wife have cost
the lives of four persons in West
Haven Township within the last five days.

Mrs. Burt A. Seely, the woman of
whom the words were spoken, and her
husband, who was suspected of the
murder of Edwin Edgar, the woman's
accuser, committed suicide last night.
Edgar was murdered last Wednesday.

Mrs. Melvin Haughton was the fourth
victim. Her mind became unsettled by
the strain of Edgar's murder, and on
Thursday she drank acid.

The bodies of Seely and his wife
were found in bed this morning. The
husband's arm was about his wife. A
bottle of strychnine, from which they
had taken large quantities, was on a
stand by the bed. Pinned to the cover
of the stand were these notes:

"Tonight — tonight is our last. Don't
blame Dewey. Good-bye, good-bye,
mother — B. A. Seely."

"Good-bye, father, mother and every-
body. Burt and I have taken poison.
We are willing to die and do so have a
mind to them, and above all things
don't put any blame on Dewey's shoul-
ders or anyone else. We alone are re-
sponsible. Your daughter, Lottie."

Dewey is Burt Seely's brother.

Seely and Edgar lived within a
quarter of a mile of each other from
childhood, attending the same country
school and settling down on farms on
the same road. As they grew up their
pathways drew apart. Edgar had the
reputation of being a model young
man, while Seely was wild.

The following statement was given
by a neighbor, who said he had been
in the house at the time of the murder.
"The 23rd shares were two allotments
of 139 shares each which had to be
taken up or thrown on the market.
Mr. Cockburn took them up. At the
solicitation of Mr. McGill he took a
loan from the Ontario Bank on his own
notes (not on the stock), instead of
borrowing elsewhere, as he could easily
have done. With this money he paid
the issue price for the shares, 120
which it was the privilege of all stock-
holders to do in respect of these allot-
ments, the stock at the time rating
much higher in the market, viz., 130-
134. Mr. Cockburn held these shares
more than two years, when, feeling he
had spread out his funds too much he
told Mr. McGill he wished to sell these
shares. Mr. McGill informed him there
was plenty of demand for the stock,
and he would dispose of it for Mr.
Cockburn. Mr. McGill then procured
Mr. Cockburn to sign a blank transfer
in a book which Mr. Cockburn be-
lieved at the time to be the regular
transfer book, and subsequently Mr.
Cockburn received the proceeds of sale,
never knowing till Langton's examina-
tion on Nov. 12, that his bank transfer
had been filled up as a blank and was
guarantee fund. Not till then did he
learn that the book was not the ordi-
nary transfer book, but a special one
reserved for secret transfers of the
existence of which Mr. Cockburn was
ignorant."

WOMEN RIDING ASTRIDE

Predicted That the Custom Will Soon
Be the Rule in England.

London, Nov. 14.—The custom of
fashionable women riding horseback
astride is so growing in England that
it can be predicted that it will be the
rule instead of the exception in a very
few years, and that it will attract no
more remark than the custom of women
bicycling. The practice is already being
followed by society women in Rotten
Row, the fashionable riding place in
Hyde Park.

Among the prominent women who
ride in this fashion are Viscountess
Castleragh, the Duchess of Westmin-
ster, and the Duchess of Sutherland. Their riding
habits are so contrived as to present
the neatest appearance. Seen from
some points of view it can hardly be
realized that they are not using a side-
saddle.

The chief opposition to the custom
comes from the teachers of horsemanship,
who find the new style much easi-
er taught. The course of lessons is
much curtailed; indeed, girls learn to
ride astride as quickly as their broth-
ers.

Run Over by Truck

Fire Apparatus in Collision, Causing
Serious Injury to Two Men.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Lieutenant Alfred
Everett and Fireman Elliott, of the
Richmond street fire hall, are both
lying in St. Michael's Hospital suffering
from severe injuries to their heads
received in an accident early this af-
ternoon.

While on the way to a small blaze
on Yonge street the hose wagon of the
Richmond street section collided with
the aerial truck, and Everett and El-
liott were thrown off and both run
over by the truck.

The men were so badly injured that
they were removed at once to the hos-
pital, where an examination revealed
severe injuries to the heads of both
men.

No trace of internal injuries was dis-
covered in the first examination.

One of the horses attached to the
hose wagon had its leg broken and was
shot.

A BAD ONE CAUGHT

Anarchist Charged With Killing of
Royalty Neatly Nabbed.

London, Nov. 14.—Two important ar-
rests were made, thereby frustrating
two conspiracies hatched in New Jer-
sey against the life of King Victor
Emmanuel, the Duke of Aosta, who is
his cousin, and the Duchess of Aosta,
in Naples.

The police received information that
an envoy had left Paterson, N. J.,
charged with the death of the duke and
duchess, and upon his arrival he was
promptly arrested. Gabrielle Lauzett,
an Italian, was also arrested, having
been appointed by the Paterson com-
mittee to compass the king's death.
