# WORK REDUCED TO EXACT SCIENCE

Productivity of Skilled Mechanics.

New York, Dec. 5. - Frederick W. Taylor, president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, at the opening of the annual meeting last productivity of skilled mechanics, and workmen in various lines of industrial activity.

The experiments were undertaken to obtain a part of the information necessary to establish in a machine shop a system of management, the central ideas of which are to give to each workman a definite task, and an exact time allowance for each element of the work, to pay high wages to those who perform their tasks in the alloted time and ordinary wages to those who take more than their time allowance. The experiments of Mr. Taylor and his associates have been conducted in

the works of the Midvale Steel Comvany, the Bethlehem Steel Company, and other large concerns.

The idea was to bring the elements of machine shop practice into the domain of exact science. Their experi-"art," and obtained mathematical formulae, which express these laws.
