

STOLEN AUTO IN WILD RACE

Car Sold for Worthless Check Caught by Detectives in Mad Ride.

Detroit, Aug. 15.—Fifty miles an hour, in a cloud of whirling dust, a 1940 Thomas flyer shot like a streak of lightning from Grosse Pointe to Belle Isle bridge shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The man at the wheel was reckless, a dare-devil driver. He had given a worthless check for the machine, and escaped with the chug-chug from Buffalo, and was just winding up a dream of speed and frivolity in the whirl from Mt. Clemens to Detroit.

As the big auto sped past a little Buick car, which was cruising about over the suburban roads, a shout went up from one of the four men in the latter car: "There he comes now!" Instantly the Buick, driven by Charles Harris, of Harris' automobile garage, tacked on the trail of the flyer, and the race was on. Detective Judd Lombard and two Buffalo agents of the Thomas Company, searching for the dare-devil and his stolen car, clung to their own machine as they flew westward along Jefferson avenue, passing telegraph poles and crossings at almost a mile-a-minute gait. The car ahead picked up speed as they fell on the trail. Sixty miles an hour now, and the two cars were speeding toward the center of the city, past street cars crowded with people; past other cars that were left behind as though they were anchored, while everyone who saw the race gazed in wonder at the sight. Sgt. William Routledge was on a Jefferson avenue car, which the racers passed, and not knowing that the Buick contained a fellow officer in pursuit of an offender, Routledge prepared to search the town for those racers when he got back. "They looked like two streaks," he declared. "Whizz, and it was all over."

Crowded on Speed.

The pursuers were sure that the driver ahead knew that they were after him. They crowded on all the speed that they could get out of the machine, but they were being distanced when the car ahead approached the Belle Isle bridge crossing, where there was a swarm of people and several conveyances in the road. He slowed down, and almost instantly the pursuing Buick was thrown obliquely across the path, and Lombard leaped from his machine, boarded the Thomas, and snapped a pair of handcuffs on the driver, a tall, good-looking fellow of 22 years.

"UNDER A SPELL"

London, Aug. 15.—"I have been under a spell, and have been like it all my life," sobbed Emma Southam, the wife of a Warwick tailor, when she was remanded on Tuesday on the charge of murdering her baby.

It was on Monday evening that a Mr. Fretwell, who lives in Friar street, heard a little girl screaming in a neighbor's back yard, and was told by her that her mother had cut her with a knife. He rushed into the house, and in a passage upstairs found two other children, a baby girl two months old, and a child of three and a half years old covered with blood. The infant was dead. The other child, aged about five, was badly cut about the head.

Fretwell encountered Mrs. Southam with the knife in her hand. She was raving like a lunatic, and greeted him with the cry, "Kill me, Mr. Fretwell!" She was at once taken into custody. The two injured little girls were taken to the Warneford Hospital, at Leamington, and are doing well.

The mother, who is about thirty years of age, is said to have behaved in a very curious way since the birth of her last child; and in August, 1904, when living at Wellerbourne, near Warwick, she attempted to drown one of her children in the water-butt, but was acquitted at the ensuing assizes on entering into recognizances for her good behavior. Southam and his wife have been on perfectly good terms, and there is no indication that drink had anything to do with the tragedy.

A RECORD FINE

Venezuela Mulcts the Asphalt Company Five Million Dollars.

Caracas, Venezuela, Aug. 12.—(Monday, via Port of Spain, Trinidad, August 14.)—Another chapter in the long standing and bitter controversy between the New York and Bermuda Asphalt Company and the Venezuelan Government came to an end today when the civil court of first instance of Caracas found the company guilty of having extended assistance to the Matos revolution, which was directed against President Castro, and condemned it to pay a fine of \$5,000,000 to the Venezuelan Government. This sum is the estimated cost of putting down the revolution. Further more, a large additional sum for moral and material damages is to be assessed later. It is expected that the company will appeal to the superior court of Venezuela.

THE SULTAN FOR PEACE

Moroccan Monarch Issues Proclamation Counseling Calmness.

Tangier, Aug. 15.—Advices received here from Fez say that the grand council, called by the Sultan to consider the situation at Casablanca, has agreed that he shall use all his influence in the direction of peace.

The Sultan's proclamation, counseling universal calm in the country's great crisis, is earnestly supported, so far as his public affirmations are concerned, by Sheriff El Gulsan, who is a notorious fanatic and hater of Europeans.

The Sultan has begged the Europeans not to leave Fez, as he would not be responsible for their safety if they depart from the capital.

FOOTBALLER POE STIRS UP WAR

Will Recruit Foreign Legion to Fight Battles for Honduras.

Mexico City, Aug. 15.—A cablegram received here from San Salvador says that Captain John H. Poe, who was at one time well known as a Princeton football player and Annapolis coach, and who recently has been fighting in the Honduran army, has left Salvador on the steamer San Juan for San Francisco, where he purposes to recruit a foreign legion to take part in the expected war between the Central American States. Poe held the rank of captain with the Hondurans. He was in the artillery branch.

He was arrested at Managua by President Zelaya, of Nicaragua, on the charge of being a spy. The best source of information in Mexico City unite in declaring that trouble in Central America is certain.

Guatemala and Salvador will be arrayed against Honduras and Nicaragua. President Figueroa, of Salvador, and President Ceberra, of Guatemala, have agreed that peace is impossible so long as Zelaya remains president of Nicaragua.

They will attack him as soon as the rainy season comes to an end.

President Figueroa has canceled an order sent to England for three gunboats, because they cannot reach him in time to be of service in the war.

He is sending an agent to San Francisco to purchase steamers and mount guns on them.

Captain Eysler, who was at one time an ensign in the American navy, and who is now first officer of the steamer Para, trading on the Pacific Coast, is to be offered the command of the Salvadoran navy. General Lee Christmas, formerly of Memphis, Tenn., who is now in command of the Salvadoran army, accompanied Captain Poe as far as Guatemala. There he will attend to the reorganization of the foreign legion, which is to be composed of Boers, Englishmen and Americans, and deserters from the army and navy.

It is declared here that foreign intervention is the only thing that can prevent the threatened conflict. Agents of each of the four countries concerned are now in Costa Rica endeavoring each one to influence that country in his favor. It is reported, however, that the Costa Rican Government is maintaining its neutrality with firmness.

SUCCESSION TAX ROBS CHARITIES

Wealthy Hamilton Merchant Makes Strange Explanation in Will.

Hamilton, Aug. 15.—The will of the late Abraham Levy, of the firm of Levy Bros., wholesale jewelers, who died a few months ago, has been filed for probate by M. J. O'Reilly, for the executors. Mr. Levy left an estate valued at \$290,205 16, all of which was personalty, and it is divided among his nephews and nieces in Hamilton, Toronto, Cleveland and Germany. There are no bequests to charity, but a clause in the will explains why this is. The clause reads as follows: "Having, in former wills, given and bequeathed 10 per cent of my estate for charitable purposes, but now understanding that a certain percentage of my estate will be payable under the succession duties act for the maintenance of public charities, I leave nothing in this, my will, for charitable purposes."

It has been understood ever since the succession duties act has been in force that wealthy men have been opposed to making bequests to charity, but this is the first time that such a declaration has been made in a will executed in this city.

The executors of the estate are Gabriel H. and Adolphus Levy, and James Rubin, nephews of the deceased. The estate is made up as follows: Book debts and notes, \$18,589; stocks, \$140,120; cash in bank, \$131,499 16, and it is left in trust with the trustees to give to the nephews and nieces of the deceased.

The stock is principally shares in Levy Bros., Limited, wholesale jewelers, this city. There are 1,249 shares of this stock, with a par value of \$100 per share.

PEERAGE ROMANCE

Winnipeg Debt Collector Claims Old Scottish Baron.

London, Aug. 15.—The Lovat peerage will probably be the subject of a long law case soon, Mr. John Fraser, a Winnipeg debt collector, having established a claim to his own satisfaction. The claimant asserted that Alexander had married in Wales in 1730, and died there in 1776.
