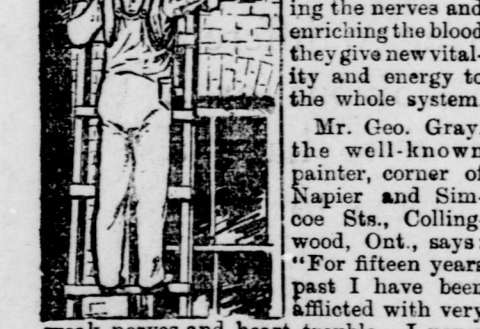

WHEEL.

MICHAEL DOWNED THE MAJOR.
New York, Sept. 13.—Jimmy Michael, the Welshman, met his first world conqueror, "Major" Taylor, the colored rider, in a 20-mile unlimited paced race on the Manhattan Beach bicycle track Saturday afternoon, and won from the negro in hollow style. Both had their wheels geared to 112. Taylor won the loss for position, and chose the starting point in front of the judges' stand.

Michael took up his position on the back stretch, the conditions calling for the men to start from opposite sides of

the track. Taylor was 3 2-5 seconds ahead of Michael at the finish of the fifth mile, but when they met three miles were covered. Michael led by 17 4-5 seconds, and continued to increase his lead in each succeeding lap. In the last lap Michael was two laps to the good, while Taylor did not ride to the finish. The official verdict of the judges was that Michael won by a lap and a half and 110 yards, which, fully calculated, is about 1,000 yards.

PICNIC FOR ST. LOUIS.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 13.—Chairman Albert Mott, of the National racing board of the League of American Wheelmen, has telegraphed W. P. Laing, of this city, that the national circuit date of Oct. 8 has been transferred from Berkeley Oval, New York, to St. Louis. This sanction carried with it the five mile national championship and 90 pit starts, and insures the attendance of all the crack riders.

MONTREAL GETS IT.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 13.—Private advices from Vienna state that the world's bicycle meet for 1899 has been awarded to Montreal. The C. W. A. will at once commence preparations to make the meet a success.

T. at Toronto, on Saturday, the hero of the hour at Goderich, and when he went home it looked as if the whole team had turned out to do him honor. He had no sooner reached the platform than he was patting high by the members of the athletic club, and carried amid loud cheers to a carriage, after which a procession was formed by bicyclists and pedestrians, led by the Goderich Marine Band, the march to the square was taken up. Mr. McIvor, accompanied by Mayor Thompson and others, addressed the large audience.

Toronto, Sept. 13.—The cricket match between Mr. Warner's English eleven and an Ontario eleven opened yesterday morning on the Rosedale grounds. The Englishmen won the toss and went to the wicket. The bowling of the Canadians was weak from the start, and the averages for the day were very low. The fielding of the home team was smart on the whole. The Englishmen ran up a heavy score at the bat. At lunch-time the game was a foregone conclusion, the score being then 82 for two wickets. When stumps were pulled at 5:30, the score stood 372 for seven wickets.
