A \$500 BLAZE

IN EARLY MORNING

Fire Does Damage at Tune &
Sons Premises—The Good
Work of Firemen.

At 1:30 this morning Acting Police
Sergeant McDonald discovered a fire
in the premises of J. Tune & Son on
York street, near Richmond. He sent
in the alarm at once, and the firemen
responded promptly.

Fire Chief Clark ordered that only
the chemical engine be used, and the
use of this piece of apparatus proved
sufficient. In a short time the blaze
was overcome, with a loss of about \$500,
which is covered by insurance. A gas
stove in the bottling-room is blamed
for the fire.

LONDON GIRL COMPLAINT

Charges Farmer Near Exeter With
Attempted Indecent Assault.

An Exeter dispatch says: "While
she was spending her holidays at his
home two weeks ago, David Richards,
a farmer, residing near Exeter, is al-
leged to have attempted an indec-
ent assault upon the daughter of a
London man."

"The girl is 16 years of age, and
she states that while she was in
the house alone with the farmer, his
wife having gone to milk the cows, he
seized her and attempted to assault
her. She struggled and screamed. Her
clothing was badly torn."

"On Monday the girl's brother had a
warrant issued for his arrest, and it
was executed on the same day, and
Richards was lodged in jail. He was
afterwards bailed in the sum of \$1,500.
"He was brought before Magistrate
Hay this morning, when the case was
given a preliminary hearing and ad-
journd."

The police here know nothing what-
ever of the case.

JOHN D. BUYS PEARLS

Paris Jeweler Says He Bought Four
Necklaces.

Paris, July 18.—A jeweler here has
coolly taken possession of John D.
Rockefeller and used him as an ad-
vertisement.

An surprising merchant has had
published as important news that "an
American millionaire residing tranquilly
not far from Paris, escaped the
watchfulness of the New York newspa-
per men and undetected by them made
a brief visit to this city."

He is the American millionaire or-
dered the jeweler to bring to his hotel
specimens of pearl collars and the de-
lighted jeweler took to him "the rich-
est collars, worth a king's ransom."

The millionaire picked up the most
costly collar, examined it pearl by
pearl, then asked laconically:

"How much?"

"One hundred thousand dollars," the
jeweler whispered. Then, lest the price
seem too high, he began to explain:

"You see, sir, these are necklaces
of 'old' pearls, the American answered.
"I do not bargain. I asked the price
only because I want to draw a check
for four necklaces like this."

The entertaining piece of news con-
cludes by stating that at this climax
the jeweler, who was nearly prostrated by
his mingled emotions.

jeweler's shop to learn what taste a
Rockefeller has in pearl necklaces.

The French newspapers almost unan-
imously agree that the cabled story is
untrue, and that the Jeweler when he

man who has beaten all America at the

PLAGUE OF LOCUSTS

Scientist Predicts That Millions of Them
Will Visit America.

St. Louis, Mo., July 18.—Within a few
weeks the farmers of the west will see
their fields devastated by millions of
locusts is the prediction made by Profes-
sor Willis Marshall, of St. Louis City, for-
merly professor of mathematics in Mor-
ris College, and now a locust expert in
school, and a scientist of some distinction
in the Northwest. According to Professor
Marshall, locusts never devastate the
on schedule time, and the winds which
will sweep over the cornfields of Iowa and
Nebraska and the wheatfields of Min-
nesota and South Dakota during August
and September, will bring with them from
the Northwest millions and millions of
locusts.

Professor Marshall also says that the
locusts of this species is due this summer,
a coincidence that happened but once in 20
years. "I have reports," says Professor
Marshall, "from scientists in the far
Northwest, who tell me that there are
swarms of locusts in Washington and
Montana, and that they are moving to-
ward the great agricultural regions of the
Middle West. Some of them will be of the
Rocky Mountain locust species, which are
not as destructive as the seventeen-year
and the thirteen-year variety."

The locust line of march can be de-
termined, says the professor, "I should
advise the farmers to dig trenches into
which the insects can fall and be drown-
ed. The rivers will be of great assistance
to the farmers, as countless millions of
the insects will fall into streams, although
but little can be done to destroy the wing-
ed horde having the migratory instinct."

Professor Marshall declares the seven-
teen-year locusts never devastated the
fields but what swarms of birds followed
them. Myriads of birds will also be seen
in the Northwest and the houses are
filled with locusts.

The fact that there are no flies worth
mentioning is ominous of a locust plague.
It is well to note that the flies are not
a pest to mankind in the west. Few
of them are seen following the sweating
herds in the fields, and the houses are
most free from them. Professor Marshall
declares that locusts do not come when
the air is filled with common house flies,
as the flies destroy the locust eggs.

"EVERY PROSPECT PLEASES"

Rev. Dr. Rawel's Second Lecture—
"New Zealand of Today."

Rev. Dr. Rawel gave his second illus-
trated lecture in Adelaide Street Bap-
tist Church last night before a delighted
audience that asked the seating ac-
commodation of the auditorium to its
utmost, quite a number of those pres-
ent being obliged to stand. The lectur-
er's subject, "New Zealand of Today,"
was illustrated by many beautiful stereo-
scopic views of the cities, public
buildings, rivers, lakes, mountains,
geysers, forests, flowers and other nota-
ble features of this island "where every
prospect pleases." Pictures were also
shown of the various tribes of natives,
their dwellings and their handwork.

Mr. Rawel, in a concise and entertain-
ing style, outlined the marked features
of New Zealand's progress and pros-
perity, its industries and the popular
provisions of its Government. Among
the latter are its free school system
and free railway transportation for
pupils; its old-age pensions, and its
postal savings banks. Thrift is espe-
cially encouraged in New Zealand, and it
is calculated that the wealth of the island
averages £5,000 for every man, woman
and child. Mr. Rawel and his clever
children won hearty applause from the
audience. They will probably
leave London tomorrow, and will say
goodby to their friends at tonight's
prayer meeting in Adelaide Street
Church.

**YOUNG GIRL IN
CRIME CARNIVAL**

Arrested With Physician After
Killing—Her Sweetheart
Is a Fugitive.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 18.—After a
night of crime and killing unprece-
dented in this section of the country,
Dr. Buck McPherson, a well-known
physician, and Miss Elizabeth Win-
stead, sweetheart of his son, John Mc-
Pherson, aged 24, are prisoners in the
Knox County Jail.

John McPherson is a fugitive from
justice, with poses of officers and citi-
zens after him in the mountain section
of Sevier County, where many of his
relatives live. He is armed with pis-
tols and will not be taken alive.

Grant Smith, a merchant, is dead;
William Waddle, a deputy sheriff, is
mortally wounded, and Dr. Joseph
Waddle is badly injured as the result
of the night of crime.

Smith was killed at the home of his
wife, Nettie Hall Smith, in the eastern
part of Knoxville.

McPherson and his son called at the
house about 10 o'clock Saturday night,
but Mrs. Smith asked them to leave.
Dr. McPherson struck her over the
head with his pistol. The weapon was
discharged. The noise awakened Smith
and he rushed to the door to aid his
wife in detecting the McPhersons. Both
turned on him and the physician in-
flicted a mortal wound with a knife,
and the son also made a mortal wound
with his pistol. Smith lived but a few
moments.

Father and son fled in a buggy, go-
ing by the home of Miss Winstead,
pretty, and 19 years old. She joined
them in the buggy, and the trio drove
south.

Two miles from Knoxville they ran
into the buggy of Dr. Joseph Waddle,
who was making a night call, a quar-
rel ensued, and John McPherson
knocked Waddle from his buggy and
badly beat him. The father finally sepa-
rated from them. The girl was scream-
ing from fear and excitement, mean-
while.

Again they started on their route.
The idea of carrying the girl was to
keep down the suspicions of the offi-
cers, who were after them.

Dr. Waddle got in his buggy and
drove to the home of Deputy Sheriff
Walker, nearby, and informed him of
the assault. Both hurried after the
trio and overtook them a mile or two
farther on about 2 o'clock Sunday
morning.

The officer ordered the men to throw
up their hands. John McPherson an-
swered by firing his pistol at Walker,
the ball striking the latter in the
shoulder and passing out through the
spinal column, paralyzing him and in-
flicting a mortal wound.

At the jail tonight, Dr. McPherson
stated that Walker was a good friend
of both him and his son, and he re-
gretted the shooting. He himself
dressed Walker's wounds and then the
trio hurried on towards the Sevier
County line.

After crossing the line young Mc-
Pherson left the buggy, telling his fa
