ACTORS' STRIKE COMES TO END AFTER FOUR WEEKS

DETROIT POLICEMEN RAID, WRECK AND CART AWAY SALOON

Officers Continue Operations
Under the Commissioner's
"Crash and Carry" Order.

MAKES TWELFTH SEIZURE

Bar and Fixtures of Cafe
Loaded On Trucks and
Taken to Police Station.

Detroit, Sept. 6.—Police liquor raid, operating under Commissioner Inghel's "crash and carry" order, completed an even dozen confiscations when they removed the bar and fixtures of a saloon owned by Demetrio Boska, of 474 Maple street, Friday afternoon and arrested the proprietor.

The "raid, wreck and cart away" system will be a regular operation of the police department as long as whiskey selling continues in Detroit, according to Commissioner Inghel. Under the direction of Deputy Superintendent James Smith, investigations are being carried on at all precincts to uncover violations. Some of the best known drinking places in Detroit have already come under the hatchets and the results of the raids are being followed by hurried and unconvincing exits at midnight Thursday when some 30 officers, including a number of well-known state and city politicians, were surprised by a visit of Bethune avenue police to the Log Cabin Inn, Woodward avenue and the Six Mile road.

Proleged diners at \$3 and more a head were left to the mercy and appetites of the policemen as men and women leaped for safety. Gin, whiskey and wine, singly and in combination, were seized by the officers. No attempt was made to arrest of diners, but the proprietor, Rudolph Merrick, and his bartender, William E. Rey, were taken into custody on charge of violating the state prohibition act.

An Old Roadhouse.

The Log Cabin Inn has been one of the oldest and most popular roadhouses around Detroit. The prohibition laws had little more influence than to raise the price of drinks, in this resort, according to the police.

The bar and some of the fixtures were loaded on a truck and removed to the police barn, but the dining equipment was left undisturbed.

BRITAIN WOULD AID DISABLED SOLDIERS

Will Propose Employment of
Service Men by Every
Firm.

London, Sept. 6.—It is unofficially stated that a royal proclamation will be issued shortly calling upon every employer holding a Government contract to employ in his factory, workshop, or office, not less than 5 per cent of men who have suffered some disability on active service.

The whole question has been discussed by representatives of the Government with employers of labor and Trade Unionists. There is, on the one hand, a desire to give preference to men who have served with the forces, but on the other hand, it is felt that to employ men who are not capable of doing a full day's work may mean the hampering of industry at a period when every ounce of output is an imperative necessity.

Meanwhile ex-soldiers are working as job pickers in Kent. Many of them are partially disabled.

Films With Communist Prisoner During Trial

Examination of Bavarian Leader
Charged With Killing Hostages,
Comes to End.

Munich, Sept. 5.—The examination of the Bavarian Communist leader, charged with the killing of hostages during the uprising last February, ended today with the taking of the testimony of the last two of the defendants, Vossel, and a student named Peter Neier. The last-named evoked great interest on account of his relation with Lieli Kramer, a well-known Communist, who sat opposite him during the trial. He admitted that he received his order to shoot hostages from Fritz Zeldner, the former Bolshevik commander of the Ludwigschulz high school, and transferred it to the fighter with his counter-signature.

Two witnesses testified again today to the alleged participation of Lieli Nissen and Dr. Max Leven, the Bavarian Communist leaders, and M. Axelrod, a Russian Radical, in every crime.

ACTORS WIN STRIKE WHICH CLOSED 200 THEATRES IN U. S.

Walkout Which Was Called
Four Weeks Ago Comes
To End.

New York, Sept. 6.—The actors' strike which started nearly four weeks ago in New York, and resulted in the closing of nearly 200 theatres in this and other cities, was called off early this morning under an agreement which was declared to be virtually a complete victory for the Actors Equity Association.

Augustus Thomas, playwright, who arranged the conference, announced that the actors had agreed to an "open shop," and that all other differences had been adjusted. Francis Wilson, president of the Equity, stated that the settlement was a complete victory for the actors' union.

RAMCO ESTABLISHES NEW WORLD'S RECORD

Four-Year-Old Trotting Geld-
ing Makes Mile in
2:06 1-4.

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 6.—A new world's record for a 4-year-old trotting gelding was established at the Indiana State Fair here yesterday, when Ramco, owned by Wilbur J. Myers, Springfield, Ohio, driven by Harry Stokes, won the first heat of the 2:09 trot in 2:06 1-4. The former record of 2:07 1-4 was made by Ublin (1:58) in 1905, and equaled at Kalamazoo this year by Echo Direct. Ramco stepped the last half mile in 1:01 1-4.

AUSTRIAN NEWSPAPERS STRONGLY CODEMNE THE CONDITIONS OF TREATY

Vienna, Sept. 5.—Commenting on the completed Austrian peace treaty, the Neue Freie Presse says: "All of the people are to be put on the rack, prompted by the policy of bleeding us white. It is the most wicked feat of the twentieth century."

Der Tag says: "Might and ignorance have dictated this peace. It has nothing to do with right and justice."

The attacks on the treaty are levelled chiefly against the financial and economic clauses of the document, especially those having reference to the partition of the pre-war debt.

ALFRED LOHMANN DIES.

Bremen, Friday, Sept. 5.—Alfred Lohmann, president of the Bremen Chamber of Commerce, and founder, organizer and president of the German Ocean Shipping Company, which operated the German commercial submarine Deutschland and Bremen, is dead, according to an announcement made here today.

GEN. CURRIE WANTS TO MEET ALL VETERANS OF DISTRICT

General Sir Arthur Currie, who visits London officially Monday, has expressed the desire to meet all district returned overseas officers personally, either at the Canadian Club luncheon or at the Western Fair, Queen's Park, in the afternoon. The general has requested that all returned soldiers in the district turn out Monday, and he stipulates that the fact that many have no uniform is not to prevent them from appearing. Sir Arthur states that he will be in France to meet them here Monday. By special request from military headquarters here, all officers attending the luncheon to be tendered General Currie at the Canadian Club here Monday, are desired to wear their uniforms, and to take the opportunity of meeting the general.

Body 12 Feet 7 Inches Tall, Dug Up at Jackson, Looks Like Corpse of Real Giant

Jackson, Mich., Sept. 5.—While digging a cesspool at the rear of his home, 734 North street, Friday afternoon, Orel Niernan, patrolman on the Jackson police force, struck what he supposed to be a stick of wood about two feet below the surface of the ground, and as he continued the excavation he was startled upon uncovering a huge hand.

He hastily piled the earth back into the hole, but later decided to continue the excavation. As a result he uncovered the hand of a man of a man 12 feet 7 inches in height.

Hundreds View Body.

News of the discovery spread throughout the city, and hundreds of persons crowded the yard of the Niernan home throughout the evening. So great was the crowd that police officers were sent to the scene to keep the throngs back.

The body is intact and apparently fresh, although the skin was broken by the shovel of the patrolman when he first struck the leg while digging.

Jail Prisoner Walking Along Main Streets In Uniform, Arrested By Constable; Was Out On Message

A. Barryman, the traffic cop on duty at the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets, this morning almost performed a clever piece of work: that the capture did not prove a brilliant one, but the fault of the constable. About 10 o'clock, Barryman noted the back of a man who was speeding briskly eastward on Dundas street. That the back was one of the ordinary variety did not worry the policeman, but the fact that it was shrouded in a county jail coat, and surmounted by a Castle Carter issue pair of trousers did.

Taking to chance, the officer hailed a passing motorist and requested a ride in the direction of the probable escapee. The request was granted, and Barryman halted the wearer of the prison uniform in front of The Advertiser office. When questioned, the prisoner stated that his name was Kenneth Lovitt, serving a sentence in the county jail here, and the fact that his lodgings were booked ahead for nine more months in the hotel on the way was revealed. He further informed Barryman that he was proceeding downtown on a message, and that his whereabouts were known to the authorities at the county jail.

Unconvicted by Lovitt's story, the constable arrested him, and the pair entered a nearby store to do some telephone calling. Governor Carter of the county jail was communicated with, and he informed P. C. Barryman that Lovitt is a trusty at the county hotel, and that he was not endeavoring to escape, but was on a legitimate errand downtown when stopped by the cop.

Released Again.

Accordingly there was no alternative for Barryman but to release his find, and Lovitt proceeded on his way rejoicing. A party of small boys hovering in the vicinity were keenly disappointed when the police auto failed to put in an appearance. That a prisoner in the county jail, especially one with a long term ahead of him to complete, should be allowed to parade the city streets in jail uniform was the subject of much unfavorable comment by the many local citizens who witnessed his occurrence on Dundas street this morning.

"No wonder they escape," said a local policeman today, when informed of the incident by an Advertiser reporter.

KING WILL UNVEIL CARTIER STATUE AT MONTREAL TODAY

Touching of Button at Bal-
moral Castle Will Release
the Curtain.

Montreal, Sept. 6.—By touching a button at Balmoral Castle, which is electrically connected by cable with Montreal, King George tomorrow afternoon will unveil the statue of the late Sir George Etienne Cartier on Fletcher's Field. As the curtain around the statue falls, a band will play "O Canada" and "Mon Païs, Mes Amours," which was composed by the Canadian statesman, who was born 100 years ago today.

The ceremony will be witnessed by the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire and a distinguished company of Canadians and Americans. The governor-general will read a message from the King, and an illuminated address will be presented to him from France for the celebration.

Speakers during the afternoon will include Hon. C. J. Dery, minister of justice, representing Sir Robert Borden, Sir Louis Gouin, premier of Quebec, and Thomas Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress.

Invitations were sent to the mayors of all large Canadian cities, and to the governors of New York, New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine.

N. Y. ALDERMEN NOT IN FAVOR OF GRANTING ENTERTAINMENT FUNDS

Prince of Wales Will Be Guest of City
in Name Only.

New York, Sept. 6.—When the Prince of Wales visits New York he will be the guest of the city only in a manner of speaking, unless many of the aldermen change their minds. The board of aldermen has been summoned to a firm determination among these aldermen that no city money should be appropriated for the reception of the royal visitor.

Something resembling an alderman's strike threatened yesterday because Mayor Hylan, in his letter explaining the need of funds for entertaining the Prince, spoke of other distinguished visitors who are to come here shortly, including the Prince of Wales.

Three Republican members questioned the advisability of the appropriation. Mr. Feltz said he understood some of this money was to be used to entertain the Prince of Wales, and he would oppose such action, as would the Americans of Irish descent on the board.

WOULD-BE BOLSHEVSKI GETS THREE-YEAR TERM

Quebec Judge Has No Sympathy With
Radicals.

Quebec, Sept. 6.—Judge Marchildon, sitting at Three Rivers in court of special sessions, proved no tender friend to would-be Bolsheviki and radicalists in Canada when he passed sentence on Marino Terooff, a Bulgarian, who was convicted on a charge of circulating Bolshevik and reactionary literature and propaganda at Grand Mere.

Terooff was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

Judgment was reserved in the case of Terooff's companion, Peter Angoloff.

PREMIER ARSENAULT OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND RESIGNS

Leader of Liberals Is Called
Upon To Form New
Government.

MEN OF ABILITY

In Liberal Ranks Will Be
Selected For New
Cabinet.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Sept. 6.—Premier Arsenault yesterday afternoon called upon Chief Justice Matheson, administrator, and tendered the resignation of himself and his executive staff. The Conservative administration, which lasted seven years and nine months, came into power under J. A. Matheson, on December 2, 1911, after the Liberal party had been continually in power for nearly 21 years, under seven successive premiers, all of whom were Conservatives.

Hon. J. H. Bell, the leader of the Opposition, will be called upon to form a new government. He has behind him a large number of comparatively young men of ability and character from whom to choose his cabinet. In the last Dominion election the civil vote on the island went strongly Liberal, the majorities being away the largest ever obtained. But the overseas votes resulted in a reduction of the civil vote to enable two Conservatives to be returned to the Federal Parliament.

BERLIN CONTROLS HORSEFLESH SALE

Animals Must Be Slaughtered
at Municipal Abattoir.

Washington, Sept. 5.—Horseflesh has been placed under government control in Germany. A report received here says:

"According to two new orders issued by the Berlin municipal authorities, permits must be obtained from the authorities for the slaughtering of horses, donkeys and mules, and for the sale of horseflesh or its products."

"The animals must be slaughtered solely at the municipal abattoir. Restaurant keepers must obtain permission to serve horseflesh both from the police and from the town authorities. Horseflesh food cards have a validity of 20,000 marks, and large enough to enable the slaughtering of as many as 240 horses daily."

"According to an order of the Berlin municipal authorities, substitutes for sausage, goat, rabbit, poultry, reindeer and game, must be obtained from the authorities without permission from the municipal authorities, and only at such shops as are sanctioned by the authorities."

PERSHING WILL REACH NEW YORK MONDAY

Transport Leviathan Sends a
Wireless Announcing the
Time of Arrival.

New York, Sept. 6.—A radio message received here today from the transport Leviathan, which is bringing home Gen. Pershing, stated that the ship was due to reach Ambrose lightship at 4 o'clock Monday, and would dock at 8 o'clock.

POLITICAL CRISIS IN HUNGARY STILL ACUTE

Budapest, Sept. 5.—The political crisis in Hungary is still acute and the next turn of events is problematical. All the members of the proposed Heinrich cabinet to succeed the ministry of Herr Friedrich have been summoned to reach Budapest by telegraph, giving rise to a report that an agreement has been reached with the Paris peace conference.

On the other hand, Premier Friedrich is said to have extended his original stipulations as to his retirement, and now makes his withdrawal contingent upon a guarantee by the allies that Hungary shall receive money, food and raw materials. The Friedrich cabinet continues the head of the Government. It is understood that an Allied commission is to be sent to Hungary to investigate reports of pogroms and other brutalities in certain parts of the country.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK IS RECORDED EARLY TODAY

Washington, D. C., Sept. 6.—An earthquake of moderate intensity was recorded by the seismograph at Georgetown University today, beginning at 5:35 a.m., and continuing 50 minutes. It was believed the disturbance was in South America about 1,600 miles from Washington.

DECREASE IN ACREAGE.

London, Sept. 6.—Provisional estimates by the board of agriculture show a decrease of 336,000 acres sown to wheat during the war, though there has been a slight increase in the area of arable land since 1918. While an estimate of the live stock indicates that the number of cattle has been maintained there is a falling off in dairying. The flocks of sheep are smaller than any recorded yet.

AUSTRIAN DELEGATES TO SIGN TREATY NEXT WEEK

Vienna, Sept. 6.—Dr. Karl Renner, the head of the Austrian peace delegation, has informed the newspaper correspondents that he would return to St. Germain on Sunday and will sign the peace treaty handed Austria the coming week.

SPOONING IN PARKS ASSISTED IN MAKING NEW YORK GREAT

New York, Sept. 5.—Judge Cassimir J. Welch, who is known out west as the "Spooning Judge," is going back to Kansas City to tell the park cops that public spooning is one of the things that has helped to "make New York great." Some months ago, it seems, Kansas City was aroused when its park policemen and rural constables unearthed a growing tendency on the part of young men and women to whisper sweet nothings to each other in automobiles on shady roads to reach Judge Welch defended the system. During his visit to New York he has snapped scores of pictures of devoted couples in love clinches on park benches.

EXPEDITION GOES TO STUDY WOOD BISON IN ROCKY MOUNTAINS

Unmapped Regions Will Be
Traversed to Study
Animal.

IN ITS NATIVE LAIR

Motion Picture Cameraman
Goes Along To Secure
Films.

New York, Sept. 5.—An expedition to study the wood bison in its native lair in unmapped regions of the Canadian Rocky Mountains, headed by L. W. Hutchins, left here yesterday by rail for Banff, Alta. The trip will take more than six weeks, forty days of which time will be spent in blazing a trail through the mountain country, which is said to have never been before traversed by white men.

The wood bison is a rare type of which species there is no specimen in the United States.

The Canadian Government prohibits the killing or capture of the animal, even for scientific purposes. The expedition will hunt over the results of the studies to the library on animal subjects in the American Museum of Natural History.

Personal of Expedition.

Among those composing the expedition are John Broder, a naturalist who will conduct researches into the minding possibilities of the territory; Capt. Nathan Pearl, a big game hunter, who will have charge of the expedition while on the trail; J. O. Coit, a hunter, and Warren Keates, a motion picture cameraman.

From Banff the expedition will move by horse train up the Spray River, through the Goat Range, to a point east of Mount Assiniboine, thence south to the Kananaskis River, where a path in the Misty Range to the Highwood River. From there to a point on the Old Man River, where the expedition will emerge en route to the Canadian Pacific Railway at Crow's Nest. The trail will be through unmapped territory.

DISFIGURED IN WAR, HE KILLED GIRL AND SELF WHEN HER LOVE COOLS

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Friends believed a frenzied hatred against his sweetheart's love for him to cease prompted him to shoot her through the heart and then himself. The girl was Mary Barnett, 22 years old. She had won Jerry's rings since before he went to war. Over there he was gassed, a shell whittled his leg, and now he was a bit of war wastage. Tuesday night, neighbors heard Mary tell him she could not marry him now. She did not love him like she used to, she said. Instantly there was a revolver shot, and then another. They were found dead.

EMMA GOLDMAN ASKS RELEASE FROM PRISON

Jefferson City, Mo., Sept. 5.—Emma Goldman, New York, sentenced to two years' imprisonment and fined \$10,000 for interfering with the draft, has filed application for release from the Missouri penitentiary September 27. Her sentence was based on the application contents, as she has no property with which to pay her fine under federal statutes covering such cases, she is entitled to release after serving 30 days for non-payment of the fine. United States Commissioner Geisberg stated that nothing could be done in the case before September 27.

BULGARIA STOPS IMPORTATION OF ALL LUXURIES

Vienna, Sept. 6.—Bulgaria has issued a decree forbidding importations of all luxuries, including liquors and furniture, and permitting the export only of tobacco, attar of rose, lamb and goat skins and wool, according to advisers received by newspapers here.

The Bulgarian Government reserves the right to determine whether these exports shall be paid for in money or commodities.

Light local showers have occurred in all the provinces from Manitoba eastward, and heavy rains have been general in the more northern portions of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Pressure is high along the Atlantic Coast and low over the western half of the continent.

DEMAND SUGAR FOR NOVA SCOTIA BEFORE WEST IS SUPPLIED

Grocers Send Message of Pro-
test To Commerce Board
Chairman.

Halifax N.S., Sept. 5.—Twenty of the leading wholesale grocery firms of Nova Scotia this afternoon sent the following telegram to Judge H. A. Follen, chairman of the board of commerce at Ottawa:

"Sugar situation in Nova Scotia is desperate. Cannot obtain any sugar, particularly from Acadia refinery, and shortage becoming extreme. Have not been able to obtain anything near our requirements for months. We protest strongly against Nova Scotia being totally deprived of sugar for the benefit of the United States."

"The Nova Scotia refinery to take reasonable care of the needs of Nova Scotia before being forced by you to ship sugar to western ports."

Woman Suspected As Head of Drug Ring Is Arrested

Goldy Goldman Charged With
Selling Opium to Toledo
Addicts.

Toledo, Sept. 6.—In the arrest of a woman known to the New York police as Goldy Goldman, aged 27, Government officers today declared that an opium smuggling organization, with headquarters in New York, had been discovered. The woman was arrested in an east side apartment house on a technical charge of selling opium to Toledo drug addicts.

Two other members of the gang are said to have been taken on the Canadian border by Canadian Government officials, and that five more believed in hiding are being sought.

The arrest in Toledo revealed, officially, that members of the organization on a buying trip to obtain the drug in New York, were detected there and scattered.
