Washington, Sept 5 -- Horseflesh has been placed under government control in Germany. A report received here "According to two new orders issued "According to two new orders issued by the Berlin municipal authorities, permits must be obtained from the authorities for the slaughtering of horses, donkeys and mules, and for the sale of horseflesh or its products.

"The animals must be slaughtered solely at the municipal abattoir. Restaurant keepers must obtain permission to serve horseflesh both from the police and from the town authorities. Horseflesh food cards have a longer validity than other meat cards. A horse abattoir is to be built in Berlin at a cost of 62,000 marks, and large enough to allow the slaughtering of as many as 240 the slaughtering of as many as 240

Charlottetown, P. E. I.. Sept. 6.— Premier Arsenault yesterday afternoon called upon Chief Justice Mathieson, administrator, and tendered the resigna-tion of himself and his executive. The Conservative administration, which lasted seven years and nine months, came into power under J. A. Mathieson, on December 2, 1911, after the Liberal party had been continually in power for nearly 21 years, under seven successive leaders. Hon. A. E. Arsenault was called upon to succeed Mr. Mathieson when he was elevated to the hench boout two years ago. At to the bench about two years ago. At the general election held on July 24 last the electors returned 25 Liberals and 5 Conservatives.

He has behind him a large number of comparatively young men of ability and character from whom to choose his cabinet. EXPEDITION GOES TO STUDY WOOD BISON IN ROCKY MOUNTAINS

Unmapped Regions Will Be Traversed to Study Animal.

IN ITS NATIVE LAIR

Motion Picture Cameraman Goes Along To Secure Films.

New York, Sept. 5 .- An expedition study the wood bison in its native la in unmapped regions of the Canadia Rocky Mountains, headed by L. W. Hutchins, left here yesterday by ra road for Banff, Alta. The trip will take more than six weeks, forty days o which time will be spent in blazing trial through the mountain coun which is said to have never been betraversed by white men.

The wood bison is a rare type which species there is no specimen the United States. The Canadian Government prohibits the killing or capture of the animals, even for selectific purposes. The expedition will turn over the results of its studies to the library on animal subjects in the American Museum of Natural
