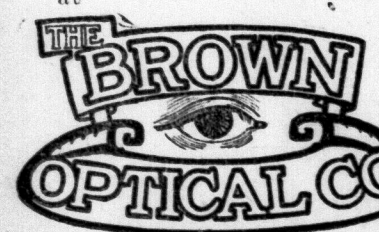

COST OF HYDRO AUXILIARY PLANT NOW PROHIBITIVE

Commission Decides Not To
Proceed With 50,000
H. P. Unit.

TORONTO, July 30.—Owing to the
high cost of labor and materials the
capital cost of a 50,000 horsepower
auxiliary steam plant for the Ontario
Hydro-Electric Power Commission
would exceed \$5,500,000, and it would
be a year and a half before the extra
power would be available. Therefore
the hydro commission this afternoon
decided not to proceed with the under-
taking.

WILL DO NOTHING FURTHER ON RADIALS

TORONTO, July 30.—The Hydro-
Electric Power Commission, it is un-
derstood, has informed the Ontario
Government that it will not make any
further concessions to the railway
companies pending the report of the royal
commission appointed to investigate
the radial projects. The hydro com-
mission claims to have misunderstood
the Government's request at first, and
went ahead with some details of the
radials in the district of St. Catharines.
However, the possibility of friction has
now been removed.

TOLMIE SWORN IN AS MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE

OTTAWA, July 30.—(By Canadian
Press).—Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of
agriculture, who returned from the
West today, was the last of the mem-
bers of Premier Meighen's cabinet to
take the oath of office. He was sworn
in this afternoon, previous to the meet-
ing of the cabinet council, by Mr.
Boudreau, clerk of the privy council.

RED TIDE HOLDS UP RECRUITING FOR DRY SQUAD

Rum Runners Thrive While
Constables' Applications
Wait.

MANY SEEK POSITIONS

Returned Soldiers Form Ma-
jority of Applicants As
"Specials."

TORONTO, July 30.—While whiskey-
runners are doing a thriving business
in the border cities, and while the at-
torney-general is announcing that
victorious steps will be taken to stamp
out the illicit traffic in liquor, it is im-
possible to justify along with the
pointment of the necessary special
constables, because all applications for
such positions must be considered by
the civil service commission.
Advertisements for special constables
have appeared in the Toronto papers.
There was a line-up of nearly 40 men,
nearly all returned soldiers, anxious
to serve as "specials" in the Windsor
district.

Among those who applied this morn-
ing was one who served four years in
France. He went overseas in the ranks,
gained a medal for bravery in the field,
was granted a commission in France,
and then won the Military Cross. At
the present stage of the game only ap-
plications are being received, and no
appointments are being made.
How many men will be actually ap-
pointed, when that will be done and
where they will be sent, no person
seems to know.

Vice-Chairman Dingman of the board
of license commissioners, called upon
the attorney-general this morning and
had a long conference. He absolutely
refused to discuss the Windsor situa-
tion.

Hon. W. E. Raney expressed the
opinion that "We will be able to give
very good reports in a few days."
He added that more men would be
sent down to the border cities. How
many, and when, he would not say.
Lack of co-operation between offi-
cials of the license commission and
those of the provincial police is appar-
ently the main reason why greater
progress has not been made in putting
a stop to the liquor traffic along the
border.

IRISH CIVILIANS DISARM POLICE IN CITY CENTRE

Succeed in Most Spectacular
Coup in the Heart of
Dublin.

DUBLIN, July 30.—Three soldiers and
three Sinn Feiners were wounded Thurs-
day night, when a body of the latter
disarmed a detail of military police in
the heart of Dublin. The coup was
said to have been the most audacious
and spectacular that the Sinn Feiners
have accomplished in the matter of dis-
arming the military.

The military police were posted at
Trinity College and at the Bank of
Ireland opposite the centre of Dublin
traffic of within view of the principal
Dublin police station. In the disorder
last night about ten Sinn Feiners held
up the pickets at the bank, completely
disarmed them, took away their re-
volvers, and then mingled unconcerned
in the crowds emerging from the
theatre district. During the scuffle
three soldiers were wounded by dis-
charges from the Sinn Feiners, and
of their assailants were slightly wound-
ed.

A resolution introduced in the council
of the Dublin Chamber of Commerce
calling for a measure providing com-
plete self-government for Ireland, has
created much interest in the chamber,
which represents all large business in-
terests of the city and consists of at
least 90 per cent Unionists.

The Freeman's Journal says the resolu-
tion is approximately to indorsement of
the proposals for common home rule.
The Irish Times (Unionist organ), on
the other hand, refers to the resolution
as a perilous act and an impracticable
demand.

FORECAST ECONOMIC WAR AGAINST BELFAST

BELFAST, July 30.—An economic
war against Belfast by neighboring Sinn
Fein territory, in reprisal for the ex-
clusion from Belfast of Sinn Fein
workers seems to be forecast in an
action taken today in Louth County.
The county council there, and the Dun-
dalk Trade Council adopted resolutions
asking traders to abstain from all re-
lations with northern manufacturers and
merchants until the workers excluded
from Belfast are reinstated. The Dun-
dalk bakers declared a boycott against
Belfast.

It is believed here that the proposed
economic warfare holds prospects of
serious events.

Masked men held up the railway of-
ficials at Newtown Butler, County
Fermanagh, Thursday night and kid-
napped the guard of a freight train.

DEPUTY LIEUTENANT FOR IRISH COUNTY IS VICTIM OF ASSASSINATIONS

Dublin, July 30.—Frank Brook, deputy
lieutenant for county Wicklow, Lein-
ster province, was shot dead at the
West Lane station in Dublin this
morning, just after alighting from a
train. His assailants escaped.

Brooke was a wealthy country gentle-
man and a close friend of Viscount
French, the lord-lieutenant, whom he
visited frequently. Except for the rule
of his close association with the vic-
eroy, no particular reason for his as-
sination was apparent up to this after-
noon.

UNNAMED IRISHMAN ACCOMPANIES MANNIX

LONDON, July 30.—The chairman
of the Irish Alliance Society in Great
Britain at a meeting today announced
that Archbishop Mannix of Melbourne,
Australia, would be accompanied to
the British Isles from the United States
by an unnamed distinguished com-
panion. The statement brought forth
cheers for Eamonn De Valera, pres-
ident of the Irish republic, from the
members of the society.

The chairman of the meeting added
that Archbishop Mannix and his com-
panion would land in a manner which
would astonish "the enemy" and create
amusing gossip for the world.

BURN ELIZABETHAN FORT.

BELFAST, July 30.—Charmont
Fort, erected in the reign of Queen
Elizabeth on the first entry of English
soldiers into Tyrone, was burned by
armed raiders early this morning.

The building, which overlooked the
River Blackwater at Moy, was long
occupied by the Charmont family,
the members of which founded the
Irish volunteers at the time of the
American war of independence. It was
used latterly by the Government as a
military stronghold.

CHATHAM TO FIGHT GAS COMPANY TO THE BITTER END

Mayor Briscoe Declares in
Statement Made Regard-
ing the Ultimatum.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

CHATHAM, July 30.—F. W. James,
manager of the Union National Gas
Company, stated this afternoon in re-
gard to the dispatch from Toronto to
the effect that Hon. Harry Mills had
received an ultimatum from the Gas
Company, that the gas service would
be discontinued on September 1 to many
municipalities, "the Union Company
has merely acceded to the request of
the minister of mines that our present
in cutting off the gas from the various
municipalities in Western Ontario be
postponed until a conference between
the representatives of the municipali-
ties could be held. We have issued no
further ultimatum. I am not sure that
the date of September 1 was mentioned
in our arrangement with Hon. Mr.
Mills."

When asked as to whether or not the
company was going to make demand
for an increase in Chatham and Mr.
James said: "That is a matter for the
Chatham Gas Company. The Union
Company cannot deal directly with
the city of Chatham. It is the dis-
tributing agency which deals with the
city." He added that no negotia-
tions there had been no negotiations
between the two companies regarding
advanced rates.

Mayor Briscoe, regarding
the dispatch of the ultimatum
alleged to have been issued by the
Union Gas Company, said that the city
has never been asked for increased rates,
although many other municipalities
have. He said that the city will be
given natural gas as long as the Union
Company is making far more than the
average corporation.

"Britain has just gone through a
war to establish the sanctity of treaties
and agreements, and the Chatham
agreement is as binding as treaties, in
my estimation, and if the Government
steps in and cancels our contract, the
Government will establish a precedent
which might have a tendency to
jeopardize all contracts, including Vic-
tory Bonds."

Fight To Bitter End.
"It is Chatham's purpose to fight to
the bitter end, and we do not believe
the British constitution will permit the
cancellation of contracts made in good
faith. If the Government has come to
such a condition that one corporation
can monopolize the whole situa-
tion, disregard the people's rights, it
is time the Government stepped in
and took charge of the situation."

It was learned today that Hon. Harry
Mills, minister of forests and mines,
made an inspection of the gas-produc-
ing plant at Chatham, and that the com-
missioner E. S. Estlin, on Wednesday
last, pumping stations and field equip-
ment were given the "once over," and
a thorough inspection was made of the
drilling operations.

The following statement is extracted
from the report of and audit conducted
by Warwick Mitchell, Peck & Company,
chartered accountants of Toronto, who
audited the Union Gas Company's books
in 1918:

Since inception of the Union Gas
Company on January 1, 1912, to June
30, 1918, cash dividends amounting to
\$2,369,530 have been distributed among
its shareholders and at the last men-
tioned date the company had a surplus
of \$2,092,244, before providing for
depletion and depreciation. A stock
bonus of \$1,660,000 was distributed to the share-
holders in 1914.

Cash value of capital assets on June
30, 1918, was \$3,319,397.88. On cash
value of productive investments an aver-
age annual return of 22.31 per cent was
made from net operating revenue dur-
ing the six years ending December 31,
1917.

Actual cost of lease holds, plant
equipment, etc., on June 30, 1918,
amounted to \$2,948,165.02.

DOCTORS GIVE UP HOPES OF MAN'S RECOVERY

Bert Cavill, Chesley, Victim
of Shooting Affray, Slow-
ly Sinking.

CAN'T PROBE FOR BULLET

Assailant Held in Walkerton
Jail Pending Result of
Injuries.

CHESLEY, July 30.—In a brief inter-
view tonight, Dr. A. Wolverson Mair,
one of the medical men attending Bert
Cavill, the local carter who was shot
by Joshua Green yesterday morning
during a dispute over the removal
of a piano from Green's house, said that
Cavill's chances of recovery appeared
very slim, and "while he is still living
he is, I believe, slowly sinking."

The doctor also stated that it had
been found impossible to probe for the
bullet, which hit Cavill in the back,
and has apparently penetrated the
liver. In such a case, death is only a
matter of time.

Speaking of the bullet which hit
Cavill in the mouth and which was
supposed at first to be lodged in the
palate, the doctor said that an X-ray
examination failed to show any sign
of it in the head, and it had presum-
ably passed out.

Green, who later gave himself up to
the local police, is alleged to have
fired four shots at his victim, but two
went astray. He is at the present time
in Walkerton jail, held on a charge of
shooting with intent.

WHEAT IS SOLD AT LESS THAN U. S. GUARANTEE

For First Time Since Control
Ended, Chicago Price
Goes Below.

CHICAGO, July 30.—For the first
time since the ending of Federal Gov-
ernment control of the wheat market,
wheat has been sold in Chicago at less
than \$2.23 a bushel, the price which
last year was guaranteed by Congress.
December delivery of wheat went as
low today as \$2.21, an overnight tumble
of 12½ cents.

Absence of buying demand was the
outstanding feature in today's opera-
tions. A generally accepted explana-
tion of the apparent reluctance of pur-
chasers was strained financial condi-
tions, notably weakness of foreign ex-
change.

Corn, oats and provisions declined in
sympathy with wheat, but kept within
normal limits. The amount of business
in the feed grains exceeded by many
times the total of transactions in
wheat. Dealings in future deliveries
of the latter cereal appear to be in-
creasing a little daily, but still are
far below an old-time average.

commercial operation on the date given,
provided there is no further interfe-
rence with the construction program of
the commission.
