Ald, John Bridge said he would favor operation at cost under the management of the Ontario Railway Board, together with legal action against the company for non-fulfillment of contract. There was no object in cancelling the franchise at the present time, he thought. Motor buses would entail higher fares than street cars, he also stated.

120 Buses Needed.

Council. 
