GUELPH. April 21.—In defeating Will Conery, the Guelph boy, here to-day, in a ten-hour roller skating grind for the championship of the world, Dan Wiggins of Goderich covered 163 1-10 miles. Conery defeated Gatess, the Australian champion, on the same rink several weeks ago by skating 1199 laps, or 120 miles, making a new world's record for the time, and now this has been extended by over 40 miles by Wiggins in skating 1631 laps without leaving the floor. Neither skater stopped one instant in the time. The pace was set at a hot clip by Wiggins from the start, and by 1 o'clock he made his lead 2½ miles. Conery never being able to get away, altho he tried repeatedly, and at the finish he was 27 laps behind. 40 miles above his own previous record. Goderich brought down a big bunch of supporters, and about \$1000 changed hands. Wiggins is practically unknown, and has a slow, tireless gait, all his own, seeming to move without effort, and finishing in good shape.
