Water Lake galloped in the mile event, Ormyr at 10 to 1, beating Renaissance for the place, all struck out.

King Thistle again landed the closing event all round, the outsiders, Inspector Purvis and Listerine, second and third.

Two interesting harness races were on the program. Paney was favorite for the opening heat, which Fox Pugh, at 7 to 1, won easily and then repeated in the next.

GROGERS' GUILD ON TRIAL AS AN ILLEGAL COMBINE

Man With Million Dollars Cash Couldn't Do Business Without Their Consent.

Chief Justice Falconbridge, sitting in the division court chambers in the city hall yesterday, commenced the hearing of the conspiracy charge against Dominion Grocers' Guild, which bars and the first hearing in Hamilton in 1904, and has been traversed at any time to time, George F. Blackstock, K.C., assisted by F. S. Washington, K.C., who was prosecutor when the case began, appears for the crown. E. F. B. Johnston, assisted by E. H. Ambrose of Hamilton, for the defendants, Messrs. Col. John I. Davidson, J. S. Elby and Thomas Kinneir of Toronto, H. C. Beckett and George E. Bristol of Hamilton, T. B. Escott of London, and W. G. Craig of Kingston. All are members of the guild.

It is alleged that they did unlawfully combine to unduly limit the facilities in producing, manufacturing, supplying and dealing in sugar, tobacco, starch, canned goods, salt cereals and other articles, and to restrain and injure trade and commerce in relation to such articles.

The case is one of the most important ever brought up in a Canadian court, because the ramifications of the guild extend over the entire country, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and as far north as the Hudson Bay Company's stores. All the big manufacturing firms are members of the guild in 1908. The list of 300 or more names includes such firms as Hudson Bay Company, Crose and Blackwood, Limited, Tren-ton Canning Company, St. Lawrence Sugar Refining Company, Edwardsburg Starch Company, and the Empire Tobacco Company.

The rules were that the manufacturers were not to sell to any firm in Ontario except those who were members of the guild, and that their salesmen were not permitted to sell any other prices than those of the guild's price committee.

J. Stanley Cook, Montreal, the secretary of the Dominion Grocers' Guild, was the first witness, and he was examined by Mr. Washington. He said he had no idea of the Ontario matter, as it was simply an Ontario price list, and that he knew nothing about the reason for its being at all.

Then counsel asked an agreement which said that the manufacturers were not to sell at lower list prices to any firm unless a note to that effect was received from the president of the Ontario guild, and the names were to be put on a list called "B", and it comprised the names of practically all wholesalers in Ontario.

"Who are wholesalers?" asked counsel, and who establishes their status?" "I suppose the wholesale traders," "Did not the price committee of the guild dictate who was a wholesaler and who was not?"

"There was a dictation about it, as it was simply a matter of recognition," answered the witness.

Then counsel changed his tactics and asked the difference between the Hamilton Co-operative stores and regular wholesalers. This the witness defined as follows: The wholesaler gets his goods at less prices than the co-operative stores, and he sells them in other words got a bonus. The co-operative people bought at wholesale prices direct.

"Supposing I wanted to get into the wholesale business," questioned counsel, "what would I have to do?"

"Get your money first," answered Cook, "and then get in and work in harmony with the other guilds, and other words apply for admission to the Hamilton Guild."

"That is," persisted counsel, "I would apply to men who would be my rivals if I started, to see if I would be a rival at all."

"That is," answered Cook, "then they notify the other guilds, submitting your application to them."

"Well, could I get goods if I went to a manufacturer and told him I had a million dollars?"

"He might insist on your joining the guild," said Mr. Cook.

"Do you know any man who got goods from wholesalers by applying for it apart from the guild?"

"I don't remember any."

"Then a clerk from the guild told the members was read in which it was stated that many of the members were not living up to conditions, and that the result was that profits were not as large as they should have been, and that unless these agreements were lived up to, steps would be taken to protect the trade. Another letter advised the members to refrain from buying goods from Canadian canners, Hamilton, and Laing & Co., Montreal.

Later on the Canning Co. agreed to act under guild rules.

This concluded the morning session, and in the afternoon the first of a long series of letters relating to guild business were read.

In a letter to Col. John I. Davidson in Toronto, written by Mr. Beckett, he suggested the advisability of the wholesalers contributing to the cost of getting up and distributing circulars among the trade itself. "They can well afford to do this," wrote Mr. Beckett, "because the new sugar arrangement will put thousands of dollars into their pockets."

The immediate cause of the explosion was found to have been the spontaneous combustion of powder in the magazine, where the temperature was too high on account of the proximity to the dynamo compartment.

FRENCH MINISTER RESIGNS.
Chief Marine Officer Held Technically Responsible for the Jena Disaster.

PARIS, Oct. 19.—M. Causton Thomson, the minister of marine, resigned to-day as a result of a vote in the chamber of deputies deploring the negligence in his department as indicated by the Jena disaster.

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ENGLAND A MART FOR IRON.
Canadian Ore Should Find Purchasers Across the Sea.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—(Special.)—Mr. J. B. Jackson, Canadian commercial agent at Leeds, in a report to the department of trade and commerce, says that shipments of iron ore from Newfoundland are being received in 1908 Middleborough manufacturing districts. With the possible exception of Sweden, less iron ore is reaching England from the European countries, which have in the past supplied the demand.

Mr. Jackson suggests that there is a good opportunity for Canada to work up a trade in this line.

Zingari's Cricket Average.
Following are the batting and bowling averages of the Toronto Zingari C.C. for the past season. Gordon Southam leads with a splendid average of 41.6, closely followed by Harry Lowmough 40.9. In bowling Norman Segram carries off the honors with 74 Woolley, who bore the brunt of the bowling in the tour to Philadelphia, captures most wickets. The Zingari record for the season was matches won, 1 lost and 5 drawn. In their six matches against Philadelphia clubs the Zingari scored 213 runs for the loss of 33 wickets, an average of 25.7 runs per wicket, and in no completed innings did they score less than 200 runs. A very fine record; highest score 401 against All Philadelphia.

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
