OVERCROWDING AT JAIL

100 More Inmates Than Cells Accomodate-Prisoners Aid Ass'n Annual Meeting.

At the annual meeting of the Prisoners' Aid Association last night in Trinity Methodist Church, Hamilton Cassels, president, in the chair, Hon. W. J. Hanna spoke of the proposed change in regard to putting the Central Prison on a modern basis, by introducing farm labor and industries which would not conflict with private

J. P. Downey, M.L.A., dealt largely with the indeterminate sentence. It had been objected to as an Americanization of our institutions, but the subject should be treated on a higher level, that of the moral uplift of the class under consideration. England had set the example by laws embodying the indeterminate sentence and ticket-of-

Dr. Gilmour, warden of the Central Prison, gave some practical points from his own observation and experience to prove the advantages of indeterminate sentence and parole over the present system. He pointed out the necessity of a board of commissioners to deal with parole of prisoners, as contrasted with the view that the trial judge was competent to express an opinion as to the degree of reformation effected by a prisoner's incar-

He further pointed out the absurdity of sending back repeaters with shorter sentences than those already served. Dr. R. W.
