Cookes Win Two. To Stop Prize Fights in New York. NEW YORK, April 6.—Governor Hughes has taken up the question of prize fight-ing with the idea of bringing about leg-islation looking to the suppression of the fistic encounters which many so-called athletic clubs have been holding for more than two years in this and other coun-ties of the state. These clubs hold prize fights under the guise of sparring tx-hibitions. They distribute memberchip cards free of charge and derive their re-venue by selling ringside seats "to mom-bers only." This palpable evasion of the law was brought to the governor's at-tention several weeks ago, and he called upon the various district attorneys and on Police Commissioner Bingham to ex-plain why they have not successfully sup-pressed such fights, and they are now busy doing so.
