Such a consolidation, as I understand it, would necessarily involve us in the responsibility of what would be done by all other nations within the empire, including the Government of Great Britain herself, their acts, their negotiations treaties, without any right or control of our own since the scheme, does not in any way provide for our representation.

Must Prepare for Wars.

"War, after all, is but the result, it

s the outcome or consequence of treaties, alliances, grievances, obligations and violations of suposed rights. A plan of this kind is destructive of the principle of seif-government, of responprinciple of seif-government, of responsible government which has been established after years of patient endeavor. If we adopt the project of imperial defence for imperial purposes, we must, as a consequence, enter into the concert, or whatever it is called, of European nations, who are groaning under the burden of military and naval expenditures.
