Reports are issued regularly to inform the community at large of current laboratory activities.

TRANSITION TO POST CONTROLS PERIOD

Question No. 2,416—Mr. Howie:

What steps are currently being taken to ensure a smooth transition from the present period of wage and price controls to the post-controls period?

Mr. Bob Kaplan (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Finance): At the time the wage and price controls were introduced, it was made clear that they were to form only one part of the Anti-Inflation Programme. To evaluate what has been done to ease the transition to the post-controls period, it is necessary to look at the whole picture. In the March 31 Budget, the various policy initiatives that have been undertaken were described. As well as fiscal and monetary policies to encourage moderate growth and produce more jobs while winding down inflation, work is in progress to attack the structural problems at the root of the inflationary pressures. An announcement was made in the budget that a discussion paper would be issued which would explain the plans for decontrol and set out a proposal for a monitoring agency. In addition, suggestions would be made regarding structural reform and improved procedures for consultation. This paper was published May 27. Using the paper as a starting point, the government will consult with the objective of obtaining a broad understanding of what is required to hold down inflation. Following the consultations, a decontrol date will be announced.

Second, the hon. member for Peace River (Mr. Baldwin) moved:

That the Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections inquire into the statements alleged to have been made by the hon. member for Maisonneuve-Rosemont, which appear in today's edition of the *Globe and Mail*, and into related or other incidents, which indicate that the rights of parliament on behalf of the people to have full and unabridged reporting of the actions of government are being threatened.

That the matter of the reference in that CBC program last night as it pertained to me be referred to the Standing Committee on Privileges and
