Development of Shannon To Save Yearly Import of 880,000 Tons Coal

"No policeman in the Irish Free State is permitted to carry arms. He relies on the moral support of the people, which he gets better if he is unarmed. In 1923 the Land Act was passed which enables tenants to purchase land over a period of years at roughly 30 per cent., per year of their former rates. HYDRO ELECTRIC PLANS. "Next came the project to develop 180,000 horsepower by hydro electricifation of the River Shannon, suggested by the firm of Siemens-Schuck-Etwerke, of Berlin. After first turning it down, the Free State Government finally approved the scheme on which work proved the scheme, on which work was begun last September. On completion, power by the government, will be provided to every village of 500 in-

be provided to every village of 500 in-habitants, thereby saving a yearly im-port of from 880,000 tons of coal. Whether distribution will be leased to private companies is not yet decided."

Professor Smiddy then outlined a scheme to drain the ground flooded by the Shannon to cost about \$25,000,000 and another to subsidize the beet in-dustry to that in six years it will pro-duce 10,000 tons a year with an annual subsidy of \$225,000.
