## GIRLS' MEET TO BE IN TORONTO ON AUGUST 7

### Formation of School Association Should Be Great Help

THE progress of amateur athletics in New Brunswick has been rather strikingly shown during the last few days when an inter-school association was formed, coupled with the announcement by W. E. Stirling, N. B. amateur chief, that fully 1,500 athletes have received cards. Probably never before has the province been so well organized in this respect and the report that Mr. Stirling will make to the annual meetings of the M. P. B. and the Canadian union should be an encouraging one. Saint John, of course, furnishes the major quota to this total but the organization work outside has spread rapidly.

In connection with the amateurs, a circular has been received here from Dr. A. S. Lamb, national secretary, announcing that the Dominion track and field events will be held the latter part of this month—July 31 and Aug. 2 at Fort William, Ont. ### WOMEN'S MEET

The amateur secretary further announces that the first Dominion track and field events for women will be held at Toronto on August 7 next. Whether any Maritime girls will compete has not been settled yet.

### Sammy Mandell Pays \$14,000 For Lightweight Crown

NEW YORK, July 4.—Pete Lazo, of Scranton, Pa., welterweight boxing champion, will defend his title for the second time within 10 days when he meets George Levine, clever Brooklyn welterweight, in a 15-round match at the Polo Grounds next Friday night. On July 15, Lazo is scheduled to meet Ted Nelson, of Richmond, Va. in a twelve round decision bout at Steubenville, Ohio.

### MANDELL WON

CHICAGO, July 5.—Sammy Mandell, Rockford, Ill., won the world's lightweight crown here Saturday from Rocky Kansas, Buffalo, by the referee's decision at end of their 10-round bout.

## HAGEN DECLARES INTERVIEW FALSE

### Says He Never Said English Golfers Needed "More Pep" and Fight

NEW YORK, July 5.—Walter Hagen, United States professional golf champion, in a statement issued yesterday branded as false an interview appearing recently in the London Evening News, quoting him as saying that British golfers needed pep and fight while the younger ones were "too good damned easy."

Hagen asserted he had never enjoyed a golfing campaign more than his recent visit to England, that he had made six trips there and looked forward to returning. The champion declared that the story in the London paper was garbled in sensational fashion and chided United States editorial writers for falling to discern that "gosh darn" was not an expression used by Americans except on the stage.

## HORSE CLEANS UP 300,000 FRANCS

Nino won by a short head, while half a length behind the second and Cerial. The value of the stake was 300,000 francs, with some additions and the distance 2,500 metres.

That hour seems easy to those who are peering along the coasts of New Jersey or Virginia, remember that Cape Nez is in the same latitude as Labrador and the waters of the North Sea sweep down from Iceland and other places where the icebergs begin.

Until one gets used to the cold it feels exactly as if there was an ice pack all over the whole body. There is a numbness that comes over one that is absolutely paralyzing.

Then, after one has become used to the cold, that chill is rather exhilarating.
