RENAULT TO SEEK MATCH FOR TITLE

Ready To Meet Wills-Firpo Winner To Prove Qualifications.

Jack Renault, Canadian heavyweight who battered his way to a victory over Bartley Madden at the Queensboro Stadium last Monday night, plans to enjoy a short vacation from ring activity and then engage any and all heavyweights in his campaign for a match against Champion Jack Dempsey. This was the statement of Leo P. Flynn, manager of Renault, in discussing the Canadian's future. Flynn explained that the vacation for his protégé will be an enforced idleness because of the fact that in his efforts to score a knockout over Madden, Renault slightly injured both his hands.

Otherwise the Canadian emerged from his latest ring struggle unmarked. Flynn said he was being flooded with offers for Renault's services. These propositions are being carefully adjusted, the manager asserted, in order that he can accept them all without conflict. Flynn particularly expressed a desire to arrange a bout for Renault against the winner of the Harry Wills-Luis Firpo bout, scheduled for Sept. 11 in Jersey City, and asserted he would make every effort to obtain this match for the Canadian as a means of determining the heavyweight post qualified to face Dempsey when the champion decides to return to the ring.

Awaiting this match Flynn is arranging two bouts for Renault in Boston, where promoters want the Canadian to box Quenten Romero, Chilean, and Jack Sharkey, the heavy-weight who recently knocked out Floyd Johnson. Newark promoters want Renault to box Erminio Spalla.

QUESTIONS
1. Can a player, after he acted as pinch-hitter, be used as a substitute runner? In a game between Chicago and Philadelphia this summer I saw Amos Strunk fill both roles for the Athletics.—J. L. P.

2. Batter tops the ball and it strikes the ground in front of the plate, then rolls into foul territory down the third base line. Umpire calls foul ball and batsman remains in his box. The ball strikes something on the ground and rolls fair. The umpire changes his original ruling to fair ball and batsman is thrown out at first. What should be done in such a situation?—E. P.

3. Runner on second base, one out. Runner starts to steal third on the pitch. It is wild and the ball escapes the catcher, going into the crowd back of the plate. The runner scores. Ground rule is one base on an overthrow going into crowd. Team at bat contends runner had base stolen and should be entitled to another base on the overthrow.—H. A. H.

ANSWERS
1. After runner has been used as pinch-hitter and not put into the lineup, he is out for the rest of the day. In all probability, permission was granted Strunk by the Chicago club to be used as a pinch runner. Such a thing happens occasionally.

2. Umpire should have stuck to his original ruling, foul ball, even though it was fair. The batsman should not be made to suffer for the mistake.

3. Runner merely goes to third base. No consideration can be given the fact that he probably would have reached third in safety. The play starts with the pitch and, since he was on second, he can only advance to third on throw into the crowd.

FIRPO SIGNS UP TO MEET WILLS

Also Disposes of His Share Of Moving Picture Rights.

New York, Aug. 15—Luis Angel Firpo forsook his training camp at Saratoga yesterday to visit Tex Rickard and sign formal contracts with the promoter for his battle with Harry Wills at Boyle's Thirty Acres, September 11. At the same time the Argentine disposed of his share of the motion picture rights to Rickard for an amount estimated to be \$10,000.

Rickard and Firpo previously had agreed on all essentials of their contract but final details were cleared up yesterday during a conference of several hours in Madison Square Garden, where the presence of the big South American attracted a crowd of several hundred persons. No details of the contract were disclosed by Rickard, but it was understood Firpo's end of the deal was to receive 25 per cent.

WALKER MAY MEET HAGEN NEXT MONTH

Golf Champions Expected To Settle Unofficial World's Title.

Although arrangements have not yet been consummated, it is probable that Walter Hagen, British open champion, and Cyril Walker, winner of the national open title, will settle the annual question of British-American golf supremacy in September. The match probably will be at seventy-two holes, divided between two courses. It is expected that one of the matches will be played in the Boston district and the other either in Philadelphia or in the Middle West. Negotiations are now being carried on by Robert E. Harlow on behalf of Hagen, and it is expected that the courses will be named within the next few days. The dates tentatively fixed are Thursday, Sept. 11 and Saturday, Sept. 13.

The custom of bringing the British and American open winners together to settle the question of supremacy started in 1921, when Jock Hutchison, Glen View Scot, went over to the other side and captured the British open title, while long Jim Barnes, then representing the Pelham club, won the national open crown at the Columbia Country Club. They met in a thirty-six-hole match at the Soundview Golf Club, Great Neck, and Barnes was returned the winner. The following year the two titles were won by Hagen and Sarazen respectively, and the match was lengthened to seventy-two holes and made a home-and-home affair. Sarazen at the time being the golf professional at Titusville, Pa. The first half of the match was played at Oakmont in the Pittsburgh district and the concluding half at the Westchester Biltmore Country Club, which was then Hagen's home course. Sarazen, coming from behind, surprised the golf world by defeating Hagen with something to spare.

Sarazen continued the winning streak of the American champions last year when he was selected to represent American professional golf as a result of his holding the P. G. A. title, while Bobby Jones, the open winner, was an amateur. Sarazen met Arthur Havers, the British champion, who came over here for an exhibition tour, in a seventy-two-hole engagement on the Seaford coast; Sarazen won easily.
