

GERMAIN STREET MATTER STANDS

Communication Before the Council—No Progress in Mill St. Affairs.

At a meeting of the Common Council of Saturday morning the matter of diverting the primary line of the Civic Power Commission from Germain street to Canterbury was laid on the table and Commissioner Frink reported no progress had been made in the matter of widening out Mill street.

A request from J. B. Patchell for permission to install a third gasoline tank and pump at his place of business Douglas Avenue, was referred to the Commissioner of Safety.

On recommendation of the Women's Canadian Club the name of Mrs. L. P. D. Tilley was added to the committee dealing with the selection of sites for the monuments to be erected by the Dominion government.

A letter of protest against the location of the Anjal Rescue League at 109 St. David street, from H. A. McFarlane, was laid on the table.

A communication from E. P. Raymond, asking for \$68.76 damages on behalf of H. K. Bamford, who had purchased one of the city buses on the West Side, on account of a blocked sewer, was referred to Commissioner Bullock.

A communication was read from the Civic Power Commission referring to the report of the engineer of the commission on the cost of diverting the primary line from Germain street to Canterbury and Mayor Fisher said it was the feeling of the Civic Commission that the original plan should be followed out.

Commissioner Frink reported that he had not made any progress in the negotiation with the C. N. R. for a strip of Mill street but would continue his efforts to secure a strip of land here to widen the street.

Commissioner Frink reported that he had made some enquiries into the matter of proclaiming a half-holiday for Tuesday afternoon and found opinion was against such a course. No action would therefore be taken in the matter.

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Holstein Cow Sets Three Year Record

Chicago, Aug. 27.—Adirondac West-ske Dairy Maid, a pure bred Holstein owned by the Bridgeford Holstein Company, Patterson, Cal., is the only cow in the world which has produced more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat and 30,000 pounds of milk in three consecutive years, according to announcement by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

"Adirondac" has just completed a yearly semi-official test with a record of 31,889.9 pounds of milk containing 1,014.47 pounds of butterfat, the amount in three years of 97,882.6 pounds, or more than 46,000 quarts of milk and 3,186.81 pounds of butterfat. The latter is equivalent to 3,884 pounds of butter, or equal to the production of eight average dairy cows for the same period.

The animal was not placed on yearly test until she was eight years of age, the statement said. Within two months after finishing her first long time test she freshened and immediately was started on her second 365-day performance. Two months after completing the second test she bore twin bull calves and then proceeded on the third test which has just been concluded.

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WAR AVIATORS IN PEACE CONTESTS

Meet in International Aviation Competitions in Sweden.

Gothenburg, Sweden, Aug. 27.—The first international aviation meet in Europe since the war, held there this month, brought together in peaceful competition fliers and exhibitors from countries that five years ago were at war. Thus Germany was represented as well as France, England and the United States. The neutral countries participating were Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden, Belgium, Italy and Czechoslovakia. Even such far away states as Colombia and Siam took part.

Great Britain's interest was shown by the personal visits of General Branker, Director of Civil Aviation, who flew from England to Sweden, and Sir Samuel Hoare, British Air Minister. 
