

PRINCESS FATIMA'S DIAMOND WILL BE SOLD IN FEW DAYS

Sons Handicapped in Raising
Money by Lack of Shaving
Materials—29 Trunks are
Held.

New York, March 21.—Where is the Princess Fatima of Afghanistan? Nobody knows, or rather nobody but herself and her lawyer, and he won't tell. Since the Princess and her three sons, Captain Gloster Armstrong, British consul-general, that she would not leave this country while there was a last desperate chance of regaining her diamond, the Darya-i-Nor, and no one off in a taxicab, nothing has been heard of her.

The remaining fourteen of her twenty-nine trunks are being held by her last ally in Lexington avenue, while the United States immigration authorities are awaiting a report to Washington recommending that the Princess and her family are aliens with no visible means of support, they should be deported. Those in close touch with the Princess' affairs agreed that her situation was one of desperation. In four or five days the court order to sell the diamond, to settle the claim of Magan Dave, was sent to Sheriff Percival Noyes. It was said by her attorney. In the meantime, the immigration authorities have sent the result of an investigation made by them last Wednesday to the Secretary of Labor recommending that the Princess be deported.

Dave's claim on the diamond amounts to \$2,200, and the Princess decided yesterday to take a last chance of raising the money and regaining the diamond before it is sold or she makes the trip to Ellis Island.

Added to these complications, the United States Treasury Department is taking steps to have the diamond returned to it because Fatima did not pay duty on it when it entered the country. So today, while Fatima remains in seclusion, the two eldest princesses have been scurrying around, trying to get somebody to advance the money to pay off the claim.

Fourteen of the Princess' twenty-nine pieces of baggage are at the rooming house of Mrs. J. Wylie, 301 Lexington avenue, who is holding them because the Princess still owes for the rooms, which she has occupied since last November. The British consul-general paid for the last three weeks of her stay, but there were many weeks before that. Mrs. Wylie said this morning with determination. Mrs. Wylie is a lady of determination. Last night, late, she said, the Prince Mohammed Sirdar Hashim Kain and the Prince Mohammed Adin arrived in a taxicab and made an appeal for their shaving sticks and brushes. Mrs. Wylie was adamant. The Princess had no money to pay for new ones they pleaded, and undoubtedly, in order to raise \$2,200 within five days they must be shaven. But they went away without shaving.

The rest of the Princess' trunks are at the rest of the hotels about the city where she has stayed, and left without paying her bill. The Ansonia Hotel has a few. So has the Hotel Monterey. She got one from the Hotel Narragansett yesterday, when she told them she was sailing for India and paid \$20 on a claim of \$160. But the Princess today has only the velvet costume, the veil and the sapphire in her nose which she had during the taxicab ride about the city yesterday just before she decided not to sail on the City Lahore.

THIS "SPOOK" DRIVES NAILS

New York Spirit Fastens Rejected Drawing on Wall of Waldorf Hotel.

(New York Times)

A phenomenon, as startling and mysterious to the officers and directors of the Society of Independent Artists as were the ghostly manifestations in Antiquity to the Macdonalds and Dr. Walcott, was revealed at the top floor of the Waldorf yesterday.

The New York spirit nailed a rejected drawing to a wall, and, above it, hammered four tacks in a card which told that the picture was the work of Mrs. Emma Mabel Field of Chicago, and was called "Impressionistic Personality Portrait of Miss Edith Bennett."

In like manner as Mrs. Field does her work, so did her drawing make its appearance among the hundreds of other paintings. Her hand, when drawing, is moved by some outside force, she says, for she knows nothing at all about art or drawing. And the picture, which bears her name, "just came," no one seems to know how.

Because the exhibit was closed before the opening of the show the Directors are confronted with the question of what should become of the drawing. It did not come through the regular channels, so it should be removed. However, if it is removed, will the same "spirit" which it back into place as it has done?

"Spooks or no spooks," said A. S. Baylison, a Director and Secretary of the Society, "that picture has got to come down. No one gave Mrs. Field permission to have it exhibited, and our walls aren't open for spooks. At the meeting of the Directors tomorrow this matter will be brought up, and I, for one, am going to fight for its removal."

Although its appearance in the right-hand corner of the front wall in Booth E-C was unexpected, Mrs. Field informed the Secretary that the picture would be shown despite the society's rejection. A special delivery letter from the artist to Mr. Baylison arrived Thursday evening.

"I am starting for home now," her letter says, "and will be under way before this letter is mailed. And I beg to inform you that I have left the matter entirely in the hands of my guide who has assured me that my poor little picture will be exhibited there whether you wish it or not."

RESCUE OF PET BEES ROBBED OF ITS STING

Veiled and Gloved Searching Party Explores Old Wall That Fell on Them—Lot of Caution Used.

(New York Times)

The survivors of 50,000 Italian bees, entombed since last Saturday by the collapse of a retaining wall in the rear of the home of Police Lieutenant John McLaughlin, 1969 Ryder avenue, the Bronx, were rescued yesterday by workmen under the direction of the Bronx Building Department. The rescue was not the primary object of the working party, which cleared away the debris to enable a new retaining wall to be built. Lieutenant McLaughlin, who has had considerable success as an apiculturist, had nine hives, each containing a colony of approximately 10,000 bees, when an eight-foot wall gave way and buried five hives under a mass of broken masonry and earth. The other four hives were removed a short distance, but in the belief that some of the buried bees would be alive Lieutenant McLaughlin equipped each with a net and a small cage of wire and gauze.

The precaution was both necessary and successful, for, although many of the imprisoned bees were alive when disturbed, none of the workmen was stung. Most of the released bees were believed to have joined the swarms in the four unharmed hives.

Lieutenant McLaughlin could make no estimate last night of the number of casualties, which undoubtedly were heavy, but admitted that he could no longer consider himself as a successful bee handler in the same class with Frank Bacon, who as "Lightning" claimed he "drove a herd of bees across the plains and never lost a bee." Lieutenant McLaughlin said that he must have lost 30,000 or 40,000 bees at least.

KARL'S SERVITOR SOLD HIS JEWELS

Crown Valuables Had Been Entrusted to Him for Safe-keeping.

(Special Cable to The New York Times and Montreal Gazette.)

Paris, March 14.—Former Emperor Charles' exile has cost him literally his crown, though that was figuratively lost to him before the decision to send him to Madeira.

This has arisen through the inability of the ex-monarch, owing to his absence from Bern, to guard his interests, which events have shown badly needed watching.

Recent reports of the sale of the crown jewels of Austria by Charles were technically wrong. It was one of his trusted servants to whom he had confided the valuables for safe keeping who initiated and transacted this sale unknown to him.

It appears that this agent, without Charles' knowledge, first pledged these jewels for 1,500,000 francs and then sold them for greater profit. The surprise of the ex-emperor over the news of the sale of the jewels was only surpassed by that occasioned by the further information that an attorney had spoken in his name in a law suit of which he knew neither the circumstances nor the persons concerned in it.

It is understood from Bern that court actions other than civil are to be expected as a result of the irregular proceedings that have been taking place owing to the forced absence of Charles. It has been established that a good part of the jewels already have been sold in France. As these jewels were smuggled into this country, the French government has taken an interest in the affair, with the object of prosecuting the persons responsible for their introduction.

The second general assembly of the thirty-seven societies which are members of the League of Red Cross Societies is to meet in Geneva on March 26-31. The British Red Cross Society will be represented by Sir Arthur Stanley, G. B. E., Sir Napier Burnett, K. B. E., M. D., F. R. C. S. (Ed.), and Sir George Newman, K. C. B., M. D., D. P. H., F. R. C. P. Sir Claude Hill, K. C. S. I., the director-general of the League, will present the report of the Secretariat which describes the contributions made by the Red Cross in its peace-time campaign against ignorance and disease. The League is a programme of popular health education, with special emphasis on the role of the public health nurse and of the Junior Red Cross.

OPPOSES BAD MILK FOR MEAT ANIMALS

Dr. Copeland Dislikes Bill Sanctioning the Tubercular Product for Live Stock Food.

(New York Times)

Dr. Royal S. Copeland, Health Commissioner, said yesterday that the Health Department was opposed to that portion of the Ferris Agricultural Recodification bill, passed by the Senate in Albany last week, which specifically authorizes farmers to feed the milk of tubercular cattle to calves and hogs. The department has not received a copy of the bill, but was endeavoring yesterday to obtain one. Dr. Copeland will study its provisions and then make known the attitude of the Health Department.

Dr. Salthe, Director of the Foods and Drugs Division of the Health Department, said that the feeding of milk from tubercular cattle to calves and hogs was objectionable on the ground that it would spread the disease, and thereby eventually cause a big loss to farmers. He could not see any economy for the farmer in such a measure.

New York City's milk supply will not be affected through the enactment of the bill, according to Mr. Salthe. All milk must be pasteurized before it can be offered for sale on this market.

Calves and hogs fed on milk from tubercular cattle cannot be sold on this market if there is any infection. They must be inspected. The presence of the disease would readily be detected, Mr. Salthe said.

"The bills provide that after those animals have been fed on milk from tubercular cattle they may be slaughtered under state inspection," said Senator Nathan Strauss, Jr., commenting on the legislation, which he vigorously opposed. "Evolution of the law is easy, for it is largely a question of honesty whether the farmer reports that animals have been fed this sort of milk. The provision under which tubercular cattle can be slaughtered by the state only after a tuberculin test, which can be had only from the owner, demands it, also remains in this bill. That opens the way for the retention of tubercular cattle in milk herds."

PLANE FALLS INTO SEA
