strike is going to cause a difficult sit-  
uation. In fact reports from Pittsburg and  
other American points would seem to  
indicate that the period of dullness that  
marks July and August is going to show  
a lightness of demand in the open mar-

Issue, with a trend toward the 315  
mark, although the sounder feeling  
seems to be that such a movement will  
at best be very gradual, if it does de-  
velop headway at all.

Montreal reports activity on part of  
British mills in galvanized sheets. Large  
shipments are being rapidly absorbed.  
There was an advance of 25 cents in  
10-16 gauge blue sheets during the  
week. The automobile industry accounts  
for ever increasing tonnages on steel  
sheets and here British costs to the  
jobbers are steady while reports from  
United States indicate advances.

In non-ferrous metals there is an un-  
changed situation. There may be un-  
dercurrents of price manipulation but no  
thing of sufficient importance to bear  
to the surface or to have a direct bear-  
ing upon the market.

The machine tool demand continues  
quiet. Some contracts on technical  
school equipment have been released. In  
this business naturally competition has  
become exceptionally keen and prices not  
far from rock bottom. Dealers report  
that May will show marked improve-  
ment in the demand for small tools and  
supplies.

Purchasing agents will be interested  
in the fact that July times for the first  
time in many months, are showing an  
advance from 12 1/2 to 14 cents a pound.  
It is said that, owing to keen compe-  
tition, prices in Canada have been some-  
what below normal and the change  
seems to indicate among other things  
that the market is coming to its senses.  
Turpentine, in response to the in-  
vitable law of limited supply and heavy  
demand, reports an advance of 15 cents  
a gallon.
