TENDERS will be received by the above named Commission up to Noon, 21st Day of September A. D. 1920 for the following work:

(1) The construction of an earth dam across the East Branch of the Musquash River, including Spillway, intake, by-pass, etc., and the grading of a bed to carry a penstock from the dam site to the power house.

(2) The construction of an earth dam across the West Branch together with the construction of a canal and the grading for the penstock from the dam site to the power house above mentioned.

(3) The construction of an earth dam across the Shogomac River, including items named above, together with the construction of a canal and grading for the penstock from the dam site to the power house.

LORD BEAVERBROOK ON PROBLEMS OF THE EMPIRE

At the civic luncheon tendered Lord Beaverbrook yesterday at the Union Club a warm welcome was given the guest of honor who in an eloquent speech discussed the most important questions of the day. Mayor Schofield presided and gave the address of welcome after which he called on Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley to propose the health of the guest which he did in a graceful manner paying a high tribute to Andrew Bonar Law, a native of New Brunswick, who is now one of the foremost statesmen in the British parliament. The Irish question was discussed as well as the Russian and Polish situation. He said England would presently be divided over the question of Mesopotamia. He continued by saying that the miners' strike would come perhaps about September 27, that the electrical workers would also go out and although England may see some of its people facing death by the cold and starvation it would resist the action of unions and would beat the strike as it had beaten other strikes. In speaking of Canada Lord Beaverbrook said that it was time that the foreign office was re-organized so that the overseas dominions might have a share in the influence upon the foreign policy of the empire. He said he was sure Canada did not intend to stand aside and therefore there was need of a re-organization of the imperial machinery giving the dominion a voice in the affairs of the empire. His

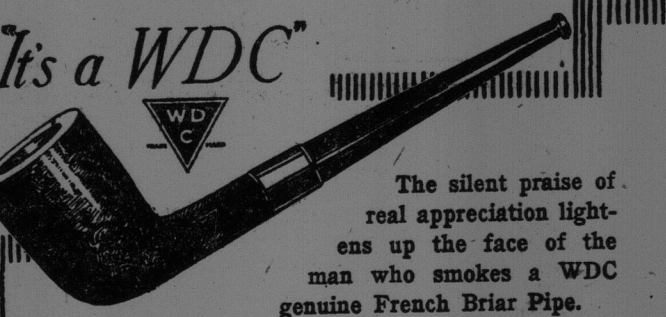

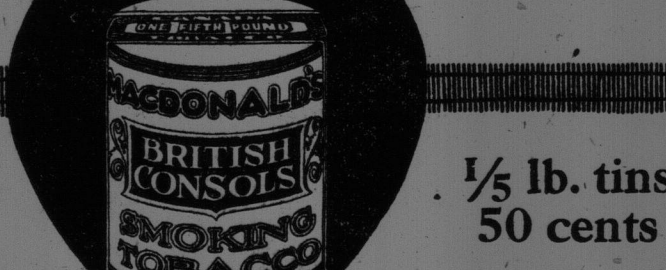
