TO PRESERVE HISTORIC BUILDINGS IN THE WEST

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 3—Mrs. Arthur Murphy, president of the Women's Canadian and the Women's Press clubs of Edmonton, as at the head of a movement to bring before the provincial legislature next spring a plan to preserve for the people the buildings known as Fort Edmonton, formerly owned and occupied by the Hudson's Bay Company, organized in 1870.

The fort, erected prior to 1863 and known as "the last house of the world," is to be restored by using the original materials. The original fort was owned by the North West Fur Company and was built in the latter part of the eighteenth century by J. Hughes, M. Shaw and J. MacDonald of Garth. It was known as Fort des Prairies and Hughes' fort in 1865. This and the Hudson's Bay Company's post were amalgamated in 1821.

W. Bird, a factor of the last named company, named the place Fort Edmonton after his birthplace in England. The building occupies a prominent site on Parliament Hill.

COURTENAY BAY INQUEST

The inquest into the death of Harry McKenzie, who was killed at Courtenay Bay, was continued last night. William E. Reynolds, engineer in charge of the steam shovel, said that he had no license, but had been doing that work for about five years. He was told by the coroner that he had better secure a license. He said he saw McKenzie being struck by the stone. The jury returned a verdict that death was due from shock caused by a stone accidentally falling on him at Courtenay Bay, breaking his legs, and that the Courtenay Bay Construction Company were in no way liable.

An amusing story is told in Lady Frances Balfour's Life of the late General Booth.
