The sermon-tasters of the First church, Moncton, speak very appreciatively of the discourses of Rev. W. J. Hurlow, who filled the pulpit during the recent absence of the pastor, Dr. Green. Rev. Seldon R. McCurdy, after several years of pastoral service in the United States, is returning to foreign mission work in Burmah. Mr. McCurdy is a graduate of Acadia, of the class of 1895.

Rev. Ross C. Eaton, after three years of pastoral service at Mansfield, Mass., has accepted a call to the Mattapan Baptist church, and will begin his work there on next Sunday. Mr. Eaton, as his name suggests, is a Nova Scotian.

An ordination which will be of interest to many in these provinces took place at Clinton, Mississippi, on May 12. The candidate was W. Harold Coleman, son of Dr. H. H. Coleman, clerk of the First church of Moncton. For the last few years he has filled the chair of professor of English at Mississippi College, a small Baptist institution at Clinton. Next college year he will be associate professor of English at Furman University.
