Before the provincial election of 1898 the late Premier Hardy promised Mr. Pattullo that it would be erected in the latter's constituency. North Oxford, Dr. McKay wanted it for his own bailtwack and threatened to resign if it went to the other riding, or within five mites of the southerly limits of Woodstock. I As a compromise a site was chosen on the boundary line between Ingersoll and Woodstock but it was found that this did not answer the purpose.
