FATALLY INJURED BY A BULL.

As the result of the injuries received from an infuriated bull, John Marwood lies dead at his home at Cranston. Mr. Marwood, it seems, had his cows, along with some belonging to Mr. Henry George, in a pasture field in which was a bull of a rather vicious nature. In the evening the old gentleman went to get his cattle, but had not got away again when he was attacked by the mad animal, which, having been dehorned, proceeded to knock down and trample on Mr. Marwood, inflicting injuries from which he died a short time afterward. He was able to walk after the accident, and it is thought probable that some internal blood vessel was ruptured. Mr. Marwood was seventy-two years of age.
