Rev. Dr. Jones at St. Thomas' Church

A large congregation was present at the Thanksgiving Service at St. Thomas' Church on Sunday evening, Nov. 21st. The service was partly choral, and was very hearty and impressive. The Rector, Rev. Dr. Edgar Jones, preached from the text: "It is a good thing to give thanks unto God." The preacher said in part: "We might find occasion for gratitude in what we consider the lowest thing—our food; or in the higher things—our redemption and the means of grace; or in the grateful fact that we have a Divine Parent to come to with our present heavy burden; or that we are in this war with a righteous purpose; or for the spirit in our brave boys that is sending them to face death for our Christian and national ideals; or for the simple annals of heroism on the battlefield and at home that are being daily told. But to-day our consideration is these features of England's spirit in this war that stands out in a bold contrast to the spirit of pagan Prussia.

A nation's honor is its greatest asset. It is the foundation of its own self-respect, and the guarantee of other nations. England's unsullied honor in this dark hour merits the gratitude of the whole Christian world. Its unquestionable staleness makes all the more ghastly the rapid parody of Germany's story of dishonor. Parallel to this story is a violation of treaty by Zedekiah, King of Judah, and his counselors, a treaty made with the King of Babylon that an alliance should be made with Egypt, but afterwards treacherously broken. And God declared through his prophet that He would regard this violation of their word to Babylon as a violation of their word to Him and to expect vengeance; and moreover that the place that recorded their dishonor would record their humiliation. What God said to Judah He says to-day to Germany.

"Our gratitude is called for also by the freedom of England from the immoral type of militarism that prevails in Germany—a militarism so barbarous in its motives, so irrational and futile in its mission, and so fundamentally treacherous in its attitude towards God, that a Christian nation would seem to countenance it for a single hour. It is a foul creation of the baser passions of the heart, and so heinous in character that to call it brutal would be a reflection on the brute creation, which to call it barbarous would be an insult to the most enlightened barbarians.

"A third feature of the spirit of Christian England is the laudable code of ethics that lies deep in the heart of the nation, the beauty of which shines all the greater in contrast with German 'kultur.' England has her virtues—they are those of the New Testament. Germany has hers—they are those of Nietzsche, whose Zarathustra cries: 'a new beatitude give I unto you—Be Hard.' And that command we have heard many times during the past year. We heard it in the roar of the guns that destroyed the noble treasure buildings of Belgium and France; we heard it in the shrieks of the drowning victims of the Lusitania; we scented it in the murderous poisonous gases of Flanders; we heard it in the crack of the revolver that sent Nurse Cavell to her death; this beatitude of Germany, England abhors, and England knows that this cruel and abominable teaching will recoil upon Germany some near day to her entire destruction."

WAR NEWS

The Governor Newfoundland, London, Nov. 24.—The Turkish position at Jeshon, eighteen miles from Bagdad, was captured with 500 prisoners on the 22nd. Our casualties were two thousand. Heavy counter-attacks were repulsed, but want of water to day caused retirement to the River, three miles below the captured position.

France reports mining and air duals. Russia: An enemy trench was captured on the Drina. Local successes at other points.

Italy: Strong entrenchment was carried on the Carso.

Serbia: Enemy reports continue to claim large captures.

Persian Gendarmerie revolted at Shiraz, and the British Consul was imprisoned.

BONAR LAW.

The Persian Outrages

London, Nov. 24.—A Foreign Office statement issued to-day on the subject of the arrest of the British Consul at Shiraz, in Persia, by revolting gendarmerie, saying without the knowledge of the Persian Government, as announced yesterday, says that the prisoners have now been removed to the neighbourhood of Ohran, where they are apparently in charge of Hans Wassmann. The gendarmerie in Persia are in open revolt against their Swedish allies. The statement adds that they held Kun in the interest of the Germans. After declaring that further outrages have been committed by these gendarmes, giving instances, the statement concludes:—These acts of rapine and outrage were done in defiance of the Persian Government, and are instances of the way in which German agents instigate violence or criminal action in neutral countries.

Ottawa, November 4.—Following the lead of H. B. H. the Duke of Connaught, who is to be the first subscriber to the new Canadian war loan, the mayor and board of control decided this afternoon that \$500,000 of the city's sinking fund should be invested in the loan. A special meeting of council has been called to sanction the decision of the controllers.

An Anomalous Position

The Herald said, editorially, last night:—"We understand that the liquor interests have retained Mr. M. Y. Furlong in order to attack in 'the Supreme Court the validity of 'the Act passed at the last session.' In view of Mr. Furlong's position as Law Clerk, we were unable to accept the statement at face value, and immediately communicated with him. Mr. Furlong informed us that it was true that he had been retained by the liquor interests, that there were several points to be considered, and amongst them the question of validity. Just what this means, we are not aware. Mr. Furlong has full right to represent the liquor interests and to fight their battles in court or in any other way that may, in his opinion, further their cause; but we submit that the Law Clerk of the Legislature violates the proprieties when he attacks in the Supreme Court or elsewhere the Acts of the Legislature of which he is a servant.

An essential preliminary to such action on Mr. Furlong's part should be his resignation of the office of Law Clerk. In that opinion more than 25,000 electors will, we think, coincide. Of course any attempt to evade the decision of the overwhelming majority of the people can have but one result, 25,000 do not propose to be thwarted by 50 liquor dealers. They will know just what to do, and their representatives will see that it is done, be the result what it may. The Herald's announcement is timely; it will at least ensure the continuance of the Prohibition Committee, and the taking of precautionary steps which, in view of the overwhelming majority of votes and districts, and of the nearly 400 more than the statutory 40 per cent., seemed, in the opinion of some, to be unnecessary.—Daily News.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.
A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.
A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.
To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.
Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.
Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.
The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:
For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 15 cts
Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 - 20 cts
Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 30 cts
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 cts
Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 - 40 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 cts
Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 - 50 cts
Maximum amount of a single order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.
