The old reciprocity treaty, being one in natural products, did not affect the trade of Canada with Great Britain at all. But unrestricted reciprocity would simply mean admitting a large variety of manufree while imposing a duty on the very same articles when imported from the mother country. To suppose that Great Britain would quietly submit to this is preposterous. It would be dishonorable and unreasonable in Canada to ask it. It could not be done. It is against common sense and against all the laws that govern the intercourse of dependencies with the mother country.

It would, moreover, necessitate the assimilation of our tariff to yours. The American people are not such fools as to allow us to import European goods at a lower tariff than theirs and then to send them across the border free. But in an tion of tariffs how could we expect to have a voice equal to that of the United States, which outnumber us twelve to one. Our tariff would, therefore, be just as well have all our laws made there. This is where the charge of disloyalty comes in.
