

### DECLARES ENGLAND'S GOLD RESERVE IS TOO SMALL WILL BE EXTENDED TO LONDON, Dec. 20-Sir Felix Schus

ter, member of the council of the Governor of the Union of London and Smiths Bank, Ltd., in an exhaustive paper on British finance and gold reserves received last night before the Institute of Bankers, emphasized the inadequacy of the gold reserve held in England, by comparison with the much larger reserves held in the countries of Europe and the United States. Special importance attaches to the paper beimportance attaches to the pa the action to be taken by Mr. Asquith chancellor of the exchequer and the Government, to remedy existing deficits. The paper is given great pror ence by the newspapers this morning and hopes are expressed that the Gov-ernment will take action in the premises when parliament re-assembles.

PRISON GUARDS BOUND AND CONVICTS ESCAPE.

VLADIMIR, Dec. 20.—Thirty-five convicts in the prison today seized and tied up the governor, his two subordinates, up the governor, his two subordinates, and all the inspectors, and escaped.
