The Lucia Nola Company, formerly the Robinson Opera Co., passed through the city at noon today en route from Fredericton to Moncton, where they open this evening. They appear at Amherst and Halifax before sailing on the tenth of next month for the West Indies.

Joseph Redmond, the driver of No. 1 horse of the fire department, was forced to ask for leave this morning on account of blood poisoning. Blood poisoning was the result and a doctor here ordered him home for treatment this morning.

THE BISHOP'S PASTORAL

WARMLY ENDORSED

Clergymen of Other Denominations Much Pleased With His Lordship's Forceful Remarks.

City clergymen of all denominations strongly endorse the pastoral letter of His Lordship bishop Casey in condemnation of the liquor traffic. Comment of the arrangement was heard everywhere this morning. The temperance forces are particularly well pleased with the bishop's attitude.

Probably the strongest endorsement of His Lordship's views was given by Rev. S. W. Anthony, pastor of the congregational church. He said in part:

"I have read the remarks of several well known writers on the evils of the liquor traffic, but I have never read a stronger arraignment of the traffic than that given by Bishop Casey in his pastoral letter. The letter, itself is a master piece—a classic—that I intend to preserve. His Lordship's language, is, in my opinion, most eloquent. This letter should be read, time and again."

Rev. James Crisp appreciated the timely letter of His Lordship. He thought that its contents should be endorsed by all clergymen, irrespective of denominations.

Rev. W. W. Lodge expressed himself as entirely in accord with the views of His Lordship. The letter would prove of valuable assistance to the temperance cause.

Rev. J. C. B. Appel said he was well pleased with the remarks of His Lordship. He thought, the temperance forces would deeply appreciate the letter.

Other clergymen also favor Bishop Casey in making his strong attack on the liquor traffic.

At the alliance meeting this morning the matter came up in discussion.



AN OKLAHOMA FIRM

WANTS TO SHOW HERE

Space for Dominion Exhibition Keenly Demanded—Systematic Scheme for Applications.

An idea of the continental importance of the Dominion Exhibition to be held here this year is suggested in a communication received by Manager Good this morning. It was a request for space rates, and an option on a first class location from a large concern in Chickasha, Oklahoma.

In this connection, re application for space, an improved plan has been adopted that will facilitate the Exhibition management and the prospective exhibitor as well. The plan is this: A card has been issued with blank spaces in which the prospective exhibitor states in which building he desires space, how much space he wants and his agreement to abide by the rules and regulations governing the show. The \$50 entry fee accompanies the request.

These cards were delivered from the printer this morning, and are being sent out to a large number of persons who have already made informal application for space. Those who contemplate exhibiting should make request for them at once as the demand for allotments has commenced unprecedentedly early.

IMPORTANT BUSINESS BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Monthly Meeting This Afternoon—School Trustees Ask for \$125,000—\$80,000 for Pavements—Accounts Presented.

A number of important matters are before the Common Council at this afternoon's meeting and the session is likely to be a lengthy one. The Board of School Trustees ask permission to seek legislation allowing an increase in the taxation for school purposes to the sum of \$125,000.

Notice of a motion for the issue of \$80,000 in debentures for permanent pavements will be given.

Among other communications are copies of resolutions from the Moncton Board of Trade regarding the public highways of the province and from the local Board regarding the proposed harbor bridge.

Alfred M. Sherwood, constable, writes objecting to the action of the magistrate in releasing under suspended sentence a prisoner charged with resisting arrest.

The Board of Works recommends that the Street Railway be allowed to double track Wentworth street on condition that they afterwards lay a tar McAdam pavement.

The Safety Board recommends an investigation under oath into the shortage of water at the recent fires.

As the Council has since appointed a special committee to investigate it is doubtful whether the recommendation will carry. There is a tilt on between two of the aldermen as to whether there shall be an investigation into the fire department this year and this may add a little interest to the discussion.

The Bills and By-Laws Committee recommend three bills, re-building of wharves, levying of rates and taxes and in reference to the city court.

The accounts for the past year will be presented by the Chamberlain and Comptroller.

The death of Theodore D. Craft took place about 7:30 o'clock this morning, after a lingering illness. The deceased was well known and had been ill with tuberculosis. He was a son of Millie and the late Robert Craft. Besides his mother, six brothers and three sisters survive. The brothers are Frederick A., William, Merritt, Frank, Walter and Hunter of West St. John. The sisters are Mrs. D. Ritchie, St. John; Mrs. Frank Colwell, Woodstock, and Mrs. Fred McKee of the West End. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon.
