Arrest Edmundston Pair in St. Leonard In Surprise Dash

Recover Tanks of Acetylene and Oxygen, Blow Torch and Hose, Stolen from Fraser Paper, Ltd., Plant, Court Hearings Today.

Edmundston, May, 27.-(Telegraph Journal).-Tipped off, they say, that the St. Leonard branch of the Provincial Bank was to be robbed, police ambushed Fred Charon and Herby Lynch, both of Edmundston, at St. Leonard shortly before 2 o'clock this morning, recovering at the same time a tank of acetylene, tank of oxygen, a blow torch and 65 feet of hose, identified today as property stolen from the Fraser Paper, Ltd., plant at Madawaska, Me.

Charon was brought to the jail here, and will be taken before Magistrate Hubert here tomorrow morning to answer to charges of attempted robbery, and having stolen goods in his possession, and also on a firearms charge. Police reported that they had found a revolver on Charon.

Lynch was jailed at St. Leonard. He will be brought here tomorrow for appearance before Magistrate Hubert. Charges to be laid against Lynch are attempted robbery and having stolen goods in his possession. Police say they were told that an attempt to break into the bank vaults was to be made, and a combined squad of R. C. M. P., C. N. R. officers and town police of Edmundston and St. Leonard secreted themselves near the bank.

The tanks, blow torch and hose, stolen on May 24, were found hidden under a potato shed, alongside the C. P. R. tracks, about 125 feet from the bank. Keeping themselves under cover, awaiting developments, the police dashed out to arrest Charon and Lynch as the pair started to go under the shed, where the equipment was hidden, early this morning.

NOVA SCOTIA COAL SHIPPED TO ONTARIO

Oshawa, Ont., May 25th - First of Ontario's larger industrial plants to co-operate with the Maritime provinces under the terms of the Federal Government bonus, General Motors of Canada, Limited, has just placed an order for a boatload of steam coal with the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, and the cargo consisting of 2,000 tons, is expected in Oshawa harbor within the next week. The company is also planning the purchase of six more boatloads of fuel from the Maritimes before navigation closes.

Under the terms of the Government bonus, \$1 per ton is paid on all Nova Scotia coal shipped West of Montreal by water. Coal from the Maritimes is not suitable for ordinary consumption in houses, and it rests with Ontario factories to increase the market under the bounty system. The desire of General Motors of Canada, Limited, to purchase material from the Maritimes however and when ever possible, is emphasized by the prompt action taken as soon as the bonus made it feasible for Canadian coal to be used.

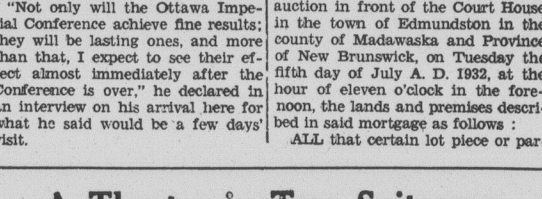
Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation has plants at Stellarton, N. S., Springhill, N. S., Sydney, N. S., and New Glasgow, N. S. Coal is shipped to Montreal by rail and trans-shipped to coal steamers for the trip up the St. Lawrence.

Previously the coal used by the local company has been imported. The present order placed with the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation through the light coal-burning season, and later, cargos will be stocked for winter operations. Although General Motors of Canada is a large user of Hydro-Electric power in plant operations, coal is required for heating, and for certain steam presses.

LOOKS TO OTTAWA SAYS BEAVERBROOK FOR FINE RESULTS

Montreal, May, 25. - An optimistic outlook for the coming Imperial Economic Conference was voiced today by Lord Beaverbrook, Canadian born peer. "Not only will the Ottawa Imperial Conference achieve fine results, they will be lasting ones, and more than that, I expect to see their effect almost immediately after the Conference is over," he declared in an interview on his arrival here for what he said would be a few days' visit.

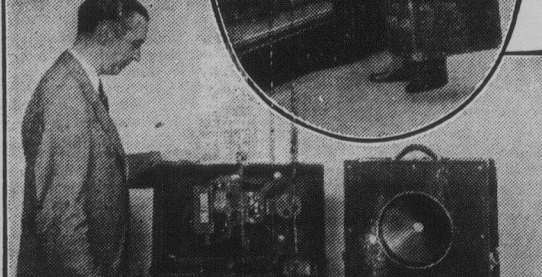
A Theatre in Two Suitcases
