Negotiations now on for Purchase of Carlisle Lines from New Brunswick Telephone Co.

Hardland, N. B., Nov. 8.—For some time past there has been a deal on between the Farmers' Telephone Co. and the New Brunswick Telephone Co. relative to the latter's lines running to Carlisle and the surrounding district.

A proposition has been made to buy the N. B. line in the Carlisle district on which to erect boxes of the Farmers' line. So anxious are the people of that district for telephone service that they have erected poles at their own expense and made application for boxes.
