## Sporting Gossip

A HISTORY

The history of the English turf
teems with stories of great racehorses,
animals of the purest breed, in which
speed, stamina, and grit were comhined in the highest degree. Fow,
however, had such a censational career as the Duke of Westminster's celcibrated horse Orme, which died a few
weeks age at the rare age of twentysix, and whose sire, Ormonde, was
accounted the greatest racehorse of
all time.

During his racing career Orme won
\$\frac{2}{2}\$,532 in stakes for his owner, and
would have won much more, but usfortunately his career was marred by
the act of a miscreant, who poisoned
the horse while being trained for the
two thousand guineas. The poisening
of Orme was the sensation of 1892,
and aithough a reward of £1,000 was
offered for the discovery of the poisonners they were never detected.

Orme's dam, Angelica, was the full
sister of another great racehorse, St.
Simon, which belonged to the Duke of
Portland, who bought the animal for
the comparatively sman sum of 1600
guineas. St. Simon, like Ormonde,
val never beaten, and at one time was
furning in the duke a revenue of
£200,000 a year. Altogether he earned £500,000.

Undoubtedly the greatest bargain in
horsedesh was Eclipse, which was purchased in the first instance for sevendeased in the first instance for sevendease and earned with his
progeny over £200,000.

Some emazing prices have been
prid for famous raceborses, however.
Diamond Jubilee was sold for 30,000
guineas, while it is generally believed
to acquire King Edward's horse, Persimmon, for the sum of £50,000, but was not for
sale.

M. Blanc, the famous French owner,
paid 37,500 guineas for Flying Fox;
and when Velocity won the Donoaster
Cupsome years ago 20,000 guineas was

Few owners, however, were more lucky in their purchases of recelorses than the late Duke of Westminster. Donoaster was bought by him for £15,000. Although this was a tall price, the animal won a fortune during his turf life for the duke, and then sired Band Qr. which won the Derby of 1680, while Band Or afterwards sired Ormonde, which brought in another fortune.


