## SEVENTH DISTRICT

MEETING OF UNITED  
BAPTISTS AT ST. GEORGE

Delegates hear encourag-  
ing reports—Sum of \$23,-  
000 raised during the  
year.

St. George, July 9.—The Seventh  
District meeting of the United Bap-  
tists convened in their annual meet-  
ing with the United Baptist church at  
St. George July 9-11.

The session opened at 2.30 p. m.  
on Friday. Rev. W. R. Robinson as  
chairman. The delegation owing to the  
severe storm was small.

After the organization of the ses-  
sion letters were read from all the  
churches in the district except two—  
Castalia and Bartlett's Mills. These  
letters show that during the year 28  
churches had raised over \$23,000 that  
17 of the 27 churches report additions.  
One hundred and forty-nine were ad-  
ded making the membership nearly  
2,300.

Delegates were present from St.  
John, Fairville, St. George, Grand Bay,  
Second Falls, Beaver Harbor, St. An-  
drews, St. Stephen, Baillie, Grand Har-  
bor, Seal Cove and Mascarene.

Tomorrow will doubtless bring many  
more.

The Home Mission Board was re-  
presented by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson and  
Rev. J. B. Ganong who has lately been  
appointed superintendent of Home  
Missions. These brethren were given a  
cordial reception and invited to seats  
in the meeting.

The devotional exercises of the  
second session were conducted by Rev.  
J. F. Brown.

The evening was devoted to mis-  
sions.

Dr. Hutchinson of St. John spoke  
on home missions in a forceful man-  
ner. He set forth the reasons why  
Baptists should prosecute this work in  
a vigorous manner. He was followed  
by Rev. W. S. Tedford of St. Andrews  
who for a number of years was a mis-  
sionary in India. Mr. Tedford said  
the needs of India are intellectual,  
economic, social and spiritual, that  
Indians have no true conception of God,  
sin or salvation.

The choir of the local church ren-  
dered helpful service by appropriate  
selections.

The morning dawned bright and  
clear. Delegates arrived from Masce-  
rene, Fairhaven, Wilson's Beach and  
North Roads. The pastor of the en-  
tertaining church, Rev. W. H. Johnson,  
conducted a conference meeting.

At the opening of the business ses-  
sion the courtesies of the district  
were extended to Rev. Dr. Harrison,  
Presbyterian, of St. George, and Ed-  
win Crowell, of St. John.

D. C. Clark, Esq., gave the report  
of the summarizing committee. The  
following show in brief the condition  
of the district.

Of the 27 churches 25 reported.  
These are cared for by 13 pastors, two  
from home settled in the district  
during the year, Rev. F. A. Curran at  
Wilson's Beach, and Rev. Mr. McKay  
at Deer Island.

There are three vacant pastorates.  
During the year 145 have been added  
to the membership, making the total  
1,178, a gain of 34. The total value  
of property is \$109,600. These churches  
report a total of \$23,942.21 raised. The  
Sunday schools have an enrollment  
of 2,789.

The report on obituaries was pre-  
pared by Rev. A. F. Brown and show-  
ed that while various churches had  
lost efficient lay members none of the  
pastors had been called to their eternal  
reward.

The report of the Sunday schools  
prepared by Brother A. A. Hovey re-  
vealed an increase in the average at-  
tendance enrollment and the finances.  
The session this afternoon will at-  
tend to education, the election of offi-  
cers and new business.
