Amsterdam, March 27.—Holland is presenting a notable example in mili-tary retrenohment, War Minister Jonk-meer, Van Dyk pointed out in present-ing the war budget to the second chamber here. His present budget was only 71,000,000 guilders when he pared wich 78,000,000 guilders when he entered upon his duiles. As the 1913 war budget represented 14 per cent of the entire Government budget and the present war budget only 8 per cent, he supposed, he added, that Holland stood in the front among the nations regarding milliary retreachment.
