

LAUDS HARDING FOR PART TAKEN IN NAVAL PLANS

World Awaited America's Lead Says Lloyd George in the Commons.

GREAT CHEERING OVER MESSAGE

Far East Problems to be Considered by the Same Conference.

"In Japan we have an old and proud ally. The agreement of 1921, which has been of very great benefit, not only to ourselves, and her, but to the peace of the Far East. In China we have a very numerous people of great potentialities who esteem our friendship highly, and whose interests we desire to assist and advance."

Great Cheering

"This statement of the Prime Minister elicited cheers from the House. In the United States we see today, as we have always seen, the people closest to our own aims and ideal," the Prime Minister declared, "and with whom it is for us not only desirable but a duty to have a friendly and intimate relationship."

There was renewed cheering from the House at this point. Mr. Lloyd George went on: "These were the main considerations in our minds and upon them we were unanimous. The object of our discussions was to find a method of combining all these three factors in a policy that would remove the danger of a heavy naval expenditure in the Pacific with all the evils that such expenditure would entail and that would ensure the development of all legitimate national interests in the Far East."

"We have first to ascertain our correct position in regard to the Anglo-Japanese agreement. There had been much doubt as to whether the agreement was in fact a treaty or a mere understanding. It was in point of fact, already in progress. On the other hand, it did not, as the agreement would remain in force until it was denounced either by Japan or ourselves and would not be exactly determined until twelve months from the date on which notice of denunciation was given."

General Agreement

"A broader discussion of the far eastern and Pacific policy to which we then turned, showed a general agreement on the main lines of the course which the Imperial cabinet desires to pursue. I have already explained that upon this more than any single factor, depends the peace and well-being of the world."
