certain lines. Reports from the interior and the far west are more encouraging, boundiful harvests being expected. In some industries the week has brought advances inwages and evidences of better feeling. Rallway earnings reported for June increased 3.9 per cent. in comparison with last year, and 20 per cent. over 1900.

Quiet conditions prevail in eastern dry goods and footwear markets.

Buyers of cotton goods take only for immediate consumption, indicating faith in theaper raw material with the new season, and consequent reductions in products. Supplemental buying of woolen is limited in part owing to the tardy delivery of sample pieces. It is noteworthy that prices in all textile lines are firmly held despite the slow movement indicating confidence on the part of the sellers. Shoeshops in New England have more orders, yet most factories operate only part time, and some are entirely idle.

Lack of rain in the southwest is the only seriously unfavorable crop indication of the week, while exceptional encouraging reports are received from most points. Domestic grain makes good progress, but bad news has been received from abroad and the outlook is favorable for large exports. Comparisons for the week with last year's movement show losses, the outgo of wheat, flour included, from all parts of the United States amounting to only 2,330,425 bushels, against 4,657,027 a year ago, while Atlantic coast shipments of corn were 77,754 bush, compared with 1,926,511 last year, and 19 in Canada, against 14 a year ago.

there is less activity in hardware, but business as a whole is good for the season, and

Unseasonable weather has a depressing effect on trade and collections are only fair
at Quebec. Jobbers and retailers report
trade satisfactory at Winnipeg, but rain interferes somewhat with sales and collections.


