FREDERICTON CHURCH

BIDS FAREWELL TO REV. W. H. SMITH, D.D.

Presbyterian Pastor, Who Has Been a
Leader in Temperance and Moral
Reform, Will be Greatly Missed in
Capital.

Fredericton, June 27—Rev. W. H.
Smith, D. D., who is to leave tomorrow
with his family for Vancouver to as-
sume a new pastorate was presented
with a purse of upwards of \$800 and an
address by the congregation of St. Paul's
Presbyterian church on the eve of his
departure and with an engraved "gold
watch" and the surface by the mem-
bers of the church. The presentation took
place at a congregational meeting at
which other denominations were rep-
resented. His Worship Mayor Mitchell
presided at the meeting and in a brief
address expressed appreciation of Rev.
Dr. Smith's labors during the seven
and a half years that he had occupied
the pastorate and expressed wishes for
success in his new field of endeavor.

W. M. Clark and H. S. Campbell spoke
in behalf of the board of sessions. J. J.
Howe, Dickson, F. Peacock and E. A.
MacKay on behalf of the trustee board.
His Honor Judge Wilson was asked to
speak as a representative layman on be-
half of other denominations. The Fred-
ericton Ministerial Association was rep-
resented by Rev. A. F. Newcomb, Rev.
Thomas Marshall, Rev. J. J. Colter and
Rev. Charles Flemington. Rev. Dr.
Smith was one of the oldest members of
this organization and during his period
of residence in Fredericton has been
most active in it.

The presentation of the purse and ad-
dress on behalf of the congregation was
made by W. M. Burns. The watch and
address given by the men's bible class
was presented by W. L. McFarlane. Dr.
Smith then made a brief reply to the
numerous speeches of farewell. He ex-
pressed the deepest appreciation of the
kind words which had been said. He
felt that it was true that the deepest
impressions made upon hearts did not
show upon the surface but would sur-
vive for many years. He particularly
congratulated the congregation upon the
new church building soon to be erected
through the bequest of the late Donald
Fraser. The building would be the fin-
est in Canada and he could say that
St. Paul's had its best years before it.

He referred feelingly to his association
with the Fredericton Ministerial Associa-
tion and the many excellent move-
ments begun in this organization. He
expressed his appreciation of the spirit of
co-operation and loyalty always displayed
toward himself and asked that the same
be extended to his successor. As the
presbyterian board of education would
meet in Montreal in 1917 he could say
that he would be able to revisit the
Fredericton congregation in that year.

Rev. Dr. Smith, since coming to St.
Paul's church from Sydney (N.S.), has
been one of the foremost Protestant
clergymen of Fredericton. He has been
prominently connected with temperance
work and moral reform and took a fore-
most part in campaigns connected with
them. He also has been an extensive
contributor to the religious press. His
departure is regretted by all who know
of St. Paul's congregation, but by the
public at large.
